KETCHELL A HARD HITTER.

O'Brien Eulogizes His Conqueror and Says He Can Defeat Black Johnson.

"He's a great boy and my hand is out to him," says Jack O'Brien of Stanley Ketchell, who defeated O'Brien recently. "I'll be the first man to applaud him when he wins the championship. I can see no power on earth that is going to keep him away from it. He upsets all the traditions—the ideas of old teachers who still hold out for the 'one-two punch'."

"Ketchell is like a hammer thrower taking 3 good turns before he hurls the ball. This is identical to the effect Ketchell gets. That wind-up punch is the hardest that was ever whipped across in a ring. Fitzsimmons never hit cleaner, I believe, but you must remember that Bob was a seasoned veteran and had studied every angle of a punch."

"They can't beat him—no man in the world can, and it's for the very simple reason that there isn't a man in the world who can keep away from him. They called me the jumping jack of the ring—I guess that I am. Did you notice his most peculiar habit and think that makes him such a terror? It's this. He tells you with either punch. He leads a right and then shifts and hits out with the left. If it hits you in the body it nearly breaks you in two, and if it lands on the jaw you are knocked silly. It is this style that is bound to whip a half-hearted fellow like Johnson. Why, he had not banged me on the jaw more than twice before I was saying to myself, 'It's all right, John, go right in and whole away—go on.'"

"Now a little of this Johnson fight. He'll whip Jack sure. If he had had my chance the other night you have only to compare the two fights to figure the result. There couldn't have been any other winner, but this boy. And this is, in my opinion, why he will whip Johnson. The negro is as flat-footed a fighter as I ever boxed in my life. Crowd him and he goes back and picks them up. Well, then, how is he going to stand with his big feet planted flat on the floor and possibly pick off the punches that Ketchell sends over?"

OREGON MEN TO SEATTLE.

Dispatch Says They Will Represent Athletic Club in A-Y-P Meets.

A dispatch with the head line University of Oregon, says: "Trainer 'Bill' Hayward will leave today or tomorrow for Seattle where he will take charge of the S. A. C. athletic team for the coming A. A. U. championships. A number of the Oregon men will compete under Seattle's colors. George Hug, '67, principal of the Eugene High school, and previously one of Oregon's great weight men, will represent the Seattle club in the hammer and shot. McDaniels, '12, and Johns, '12, Oregon freshmen quarter men, will follow Hayward to Seattle a little later on and will help make up 'Bill's' Seattle team. Freshmen Hawkins, the 'varsity' crack high hurdler, will also run for the Sound club. Hayward is expected to hear from Henry McKinney, '07, today, as he wants McKinney for the shot and discus. McKinney, while in college, tied the world's inter-collegiate record of 46 feet 6 inches in the shot put and held the Northwest discus record at 121 feet 8 inches. It is not known yet whether Captain Oliver Huston will run for Seattle or not, but it is not likely that Huston will run under the training of anyone other than Hayward."
