PET TRASH PILES TO EXIST ONLY SHORT WHILE

Old Lumber, Tin Cans, Filth and Trash Must be Destroyed.

CITY HAS POWER TO CLEAN YOUR YARD.

Council Faces Dilemma in the Fairmount Pipe Line Proposition.

Eugene business men will not have to pay the vexatious \$1 fee with each license in the future. The council last night ordered the city attorney to look up the ordinance, so that the ancient but bothersome usage can be repealed.

Have you a pet trash pile in your front yard, or an old traditional lumber pile? If you have, watch it closely. The council last night passed an ordinance declaring just such things a nuisance, and giving to the city officers the right to remove and destroy them. Furthermore, if you are a business man and have a really "fine lot of dry goods boxes," that you think "so much" of, also take care, for boxes are also mentioned in the ordinance.

The ordinance reads trash, filth, boxes, brush, tin cans, decayed or charred or old timber. After five days' notice the owner can be fined \$10. The city also has the privilege of removing the trash and charging it to the property. The purpose of the council in this ordinance is to make Eugene beautiful, more beautiful than ever before, and to destroy the fire dangers, in the back yards, back of the stores, and on the back streets.

The question of old shacks for business blocks arose again last night with the discussion of a wooden building on Ninth street, to be occupied by a plumbing shop. A glass front has been put in the wooden structure without permission. The council ordered the police department to act, if the law has been broken. Members of the council

said that they wanted to have the ordinance strictly enforced, and asked that no member grant any requests to property owners to improve old shed buildings.

Health Report.

In the report of the health committee, J. M. Williams reported that the dump at the corner of Fifth and High is not a menace to health. Neither is the manure on the Campbell property, near Professor Glen's residence, he said, taking up a second complaint. "But the septic tank on Patterson and Sixteenth streets is defective and a nuisance," he continued. The council ordered that rubbish of the first complaint be hauled away, and that the third be abated. A nuisance on the Davis' lot on West High street was ordered abated.

The council also ordered the health committee to investigate a complaint against W. T. Campbell's property on Olive street.

Alley Contracts.

Contracts for seven alleys were let last night by the council to the Warren Construction Company.

The prices were as follows: Excavation \$7.75, embankment or fill, per cubic yard, \$5.50. Bituminous surface including the bituminous crushed rock foundation and surface finishing course, per square yard, \$2.10; grate inlets, price each, \$8.33; vitrified sewer pipe, 6 inch, per lineal foot, \$5.55; cast iron sewer pipe, 5 inch, per lineal foot, \$1.10. The alleys are between Sixth and Seventh streets, from Olive to Willamette street; between Seventh and Eighth street, from Olive to Park street; between Eighth and Ninth streets, from Pearl to Park street; between Willamette and Oak street, from Ninth to Park street; between Seventh and Eighth streets, from Pearl to Park street; between Eighth and Ninth streets, from Willamette to Park street; and between Oak and Pearl streets from Ninth to Tenth street.

The Fairmount Lane.

Councilman Garrett continued his fight in the council for a pipe line to Fairmount. "I am willing to compromise on a 10-inch pipe," he said, "but I want to see the line go through." Superintendent Taylor reported, "We have laid 1010 feet on West Eighth street of 4-inch pipe." And the water system question was dropped for the night, after another half hour of talk and discussion. The problem that the council faces on the pipe line to Fairmount is the making of finances meet the problematical expense of further construction on the power plant on the McKenzie, and the cost of the line and materials to Fairmount. In the construction fund about \$13,000 is on hand. Councilmen Garrett and Roach stated to the council that they believe this sum to be sufficient to the needs, but Heller, Henderson, Williams, Moon, and Gilbert appear to doubt that the money will do that and dig wells in addition. Gilbert and Berger have not taken definite stands in the council meeting.

If the council doesn't build a pipe line the \$20,000 school house is left unprotected as well as 150 other

houses. Such is the dilemma that the council faces.

The Odd Bits.

The cement limits of the city were extended to the end of the pavement on West Eighth street.

Letters of recommendation were opened concerning the stove pipe. The Washington Pipe and Foundry Co. claim that the best known engineers consider it best of all pipes except cast iron.

Councilmen Roach, Garrett, Gilbert, Moon, Williamson, Heller, Henderson, Mayor Matlock and Recorder Bryson were present. The next meeting will be Wednesday night.

The City of Florence That Is Attracting the Attention of the Entire Country

The following is what the Oregonian says of Florence;

Florence via Gardiner brings the glad tidings that out of a total of 323 votes counted on the Port of Siuslaw bill, 303 were for organizing the port and bonding the western Laane in the sum of \$100,000 for improvement of the bar. This means that the measure has carried overwhelmingly and that the day of Siuslaw emancipation is at hand.

Nothing has happened in Lane county for some time that has given more pleasure nor that has been a greater source of satisfaction to all the people of the county. Western Lane had it opportunity and has made the most of it. That section can now put itself in position to command attention from the industrial world about it. Passing the port bill has put western Lane on the map good and strong, and there will be things doing in that section of Oregon's coast line that will develop its variety of latent resources beyond the highly sanguine expectations of its most optimistic citizenship.

Western Lane's course opens a promising new field for activity of the whole country along many lines. A deepened harbor calls for an and west road from the interior where our commodities can reach

out to the world's markets on a competitive freight rate that will make them sell in competition with those from other equally favored sections. A deepened harbor will call for a steady cutting away on the billions of feet of timber now standing waving idly in the coast breezes and holding in their arms industrial wealth ready to bestow it upon well directed energy; scattering fruit farms will be augmented by broad acres of orchards; dairy farms will grace the valleys and flocks and herds will increase with marked rapidity. Florence will blossom forth as a seaport city of prominence and every hamlet and village within the borders of Lane's western empire will feel the thrill of renewed life and vigor. These are some of the things that will make that section of the country sought after by investors; it will open a new field of virgin territory to safe and sound investment by homeseekers, that are now pouring into the west by the thousands; it will widen the prestige of all Lane county as a territory rich in resources and opportunity.

Siuslaw has certainly done a wise thing in voting itself into a port. It has been adrift at sea for some time, an isolated section of the coast. It has made harbor and is "safe within the vale," its future is assured.
