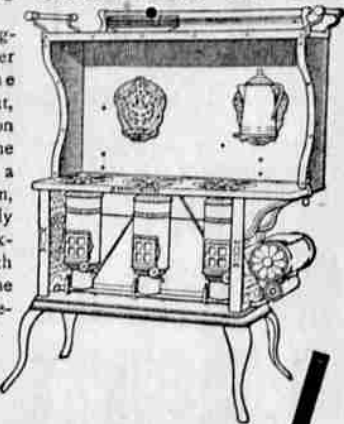

## AWAY WITH THE FOOD PRESERVATIVES

Medics Begin Fight Against Chemicals With Blessing of Taft.

Washington, D. C., June 22.—As the result of the encouragement given the American Medical Association by President Taft, that organization will prosecute its campaign against benzoate of soda with increased vigor. It will be joined by the association of State and National Dairy and Food Commissioners, and the Public Health League, as well as by other state and national organizations. It was expected that the association of food commissioners would head the movement for federal inspection of food factories and the absolute prohibition by law of chemical preservatives. They will not meet until next August at Denver, however, and the American Medical Association, which is determined that benzoate of soda must go, decided not to wait and took action at its annual convention in Atlantic City the second week in June.

President Taft heard of the resolutions adopted and invited the committee on medical legislation, through his personal friend and fellow-townsmen, Dr. Charles A. L. Reed, of Cincinnati, its chairman, to pay him a call in Washington. "I want the pure food law enforced as the lawmakers intended it should be," said the president, adding that he intended his words to be significant. The committee interpreted this as meaning that the president was in sympathy with their unalterable opposition to benzoate of soda, borax, formaldehyde and other chemical preservatives.

At the present time Eugene people may find in the store both the fine and applied arts that can not be found in other places in the west, and many of the objects that are to be found only in the most progressive cities, are to be found here.

This store has always carried the Mather Books, the Roycroft publications, and work from the Village Press, the Riverside Blue Side Press, as well as examples of binding by some of the best binders of Europe and America. The store has made a special feature of pottery and probably has the most representative collection of American pottery of any single place in the country. Here may be found examples of Rockwood, Greeley, Van Bruggle, Pewabic, Newcomb, Metelhead and other works of American painters.

Oil paintings of merit, American and Japanese water colors, wood block prints, metal work, leather work, brassware, blown glass and needlework are among the things that have made this store a noteworthy place to those who visit all parts of the country.
