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KNIGHTS GATHER
AT PENDLETON

Grand Lodge Sessions Begin
Tonight with Spectacular
Uniformed Parade.

Pendleton, Or., June 21.—Delegates began arriving here as early as last night for the annual session of the grand lodge of Knights of Pythias which will be in convocation here for two days.

The beginning session tonight will be chiefly social in character. It is expected that a great majority of the 500 delegates and visitors coming from 80 different lodges of the state will be here late today. The grand lodge session will be ushered in tonight in a spectacular public parade of autos, horsemen and uniformed men, which in size and elaborateness is expected to be the greatest event of its sort ever held in eastern Oregon. The town is being elaborately decorated for the event.

YOUTH WITH SHOTGUN
BARELY MISSES BURGLAR

Cottage Grove, Or., June 21.—Burglars attempted to enter the bedroom window in the rear of the grocery store of W. V. Dewald, in East Cottage Grove, by breaking a window pane at the head of the bed where Mr. Dewald's son was sleeping. When the glass struck the bed young Dewald awoke, grasped his shotgun, aimed for the hands of the burglar and fired, but missed the mark. He ran to the store, where another burglar was trying to force the door open, and succeeded in scaring away the thieves. Only a short time ago thugs entered this same store and almost killed Mr. Dewald by beating him over the head with a revolver, and only by the timely interference of Mrs. Dewald were they scared away. These two are serving a term in the state penitentiary at Salem.

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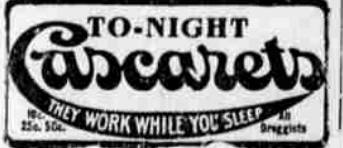
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
