WATER SITUATION
FULLY EXPLAINED

Upper Reservoir is Pumped Full in Fifty-one Hours.

Editor Daily Guard: I wish to state a few facts in regard to the water situation that ought to be of interest to all residents of Eugene, a fact which will certainly not hurt any one. The upper reservoir was cleaned out last Thursday and the pumps were started to fill it at 2 o'clock p.m. We began again Saturday at 8 p.m., and cut it off until Saturday. We began again Saturday at 8 a.m. and had it full at 4 a.m. Tuesday. We were obliged to stop several times to allow the transformers to cool, but kept the actual time and find it required just 51 hours to fill the upper reservoir. Besides it must be remembered that the water was being used all the time, and that the city is using more now than ever before. This is the shortest time in which the reservoir has ever been filled, to the best of our knowledge. Credit should be given to the men who are running the pumps and who appear to be working for the interests of the city, twelve hours each day and seven days in the week. Respectfully submitted, GEO.
