## EUGENE'S WONDERFUL GROWTH.

The Oregonian in a recent editorial said:

"The towns and cities are taking pride in their appearance, in the improvement of their streets, in better architecture for the new buildings and in substitution for buildings of old form and construction new, modern, tasteful and commodious plans. It is worth not a little to see such towns as Salem and Eugene, Baker and La Grande at this day, compare them with the remembered appearance of former times."

The many Portland visitors who are in town today have an opportunity to verify the statements of the Oregonian. Some of them were here a year ago on a similar occasion and cannot fail to note the wonderful advancement made here during the past twelve months. If they will come again next year they will find the improvement still more marked, because by that time the fine buildings, including the new hotel, Y. M. C. A. and many others, now in course of construction, will have been completed, and in addition to these they will find a splendid city hall, Elks' temple, several new business blocks and scores of beautiful homes that are not here now.

The Oregonian is right in its conclusion that the towns of the state are growing. Of them all Eugene is far in the lead in the matter of substantial improvements that end to make a city beautiful.

We believe Judge Galloway's decision upon the Crater Lake act is good law and good sense. It was purely local legislation and the people of the whole state should not be taxed to pay the appropriation that the bill calls for. Besides, we need other roads more than an auto highway from Medford to Crater Lake, when there are such poor roads to pass over in order to get to it. The Guard believes there should be a state highway from one end of Oregon to the other, well built and macadamized, and would be willing to see this \$100,000 appropriation expended in Jackson county for such a purpose. It is not that we are opposed to Southern Oregon securing the money, but we would like to see it go toward making a highway that would in time extend from the Columbia river to the California state line. After that we will assist in securing an appropriation to construct the road to Crater Lake, or any other important section of the state.
