EARLY FIRE DESTROYS A TAILOR SHOP

George McLeod is Loser \$1800
With \$100 Insurance—Dr.
Biddle Owned Building.

This morning about 6:30 o'clock fire was discovered in the small residence owned by Dr. G. W. Biddle and occupied by George McLeod, the tailor, and J. J. Hess, presser and cleaner, across the alley from Otto's grill on East Seventh street, and before an alarm could be turned in the whole building was enveloped in flames.

The firemen responded soon after the alarm was given and a few minutes afterward had two streams playing on the burning building, one from the hydrant at the corner of East Seventh and Oak streets and the other at Seventh and Willamette. A. O. Bray acted as engine driver. He made a quick run. The fire had gained such headway by the explosion of a quantity of gasoline that it was not possible to save any of the contents and the building is a total ruin inside and will have to be torn down.

McLeod, the tailor, lost in goods, shop and household fixtures and personal effects about \$1800, and was insured for \$1000 in the German-American and Phoenix companies, I. J. Wolcott, local agent. The loss to the building is about \$1000 with \$500 insurance.

It is not definitely known how the fire started, but it is presumed that it was from the gasoline stove that was used to heat water for pressing purposes. The flames were first discovered by McLeod, who was in the back yard. J. J. Hess, who conducted the pressing and cleaning department of the shop, was in the kitchen at the time and when he looked toward the front part of the house the flames were pouring out of the front rooms toward the rear. A minute or two after the fire was discovered a gallon bottle of gasoline in the front room exploded with a loud report and of course the spreading of the flames about the room caused the flames to increase in fury.

Besides his tailor shop fixtures and household goods McLeod lost six goods-suits of clothes of his own besides about \$500 worth of stock and 18 or 20 suits finished or partly finished for his customers. His loss was about \$200. He carried no insurance on his belongings. Mrs. McLeod and little son were at Albany, where they have been visiting for several days.

TACOMA TOURISTS WERE VICTIMS OF LAKE DISASTER

Killarney, Ireland, June 23.—A large rowboat carrying five American and four English tourists and four Irish boatmen was swamped in a gale while crossing lower Killarney Lake this afternoon. All of the tourists and two of the boatmen were drowned.

The victims are, Mrs. A. A. Hilton and son, of Tacoma, Wash. Mr. and Mrs. Loughhead (or Loughhead) of Boston; Miss M. H. Calum (or Calum) of Massachusetts (town not known); Rev. B. Barton and sister of London, and Miss Florence Wilkinson and cousin of Brentwood, Essex; boatmen: Con Toomey and Con Gleeson. None of the bodies were recovered.

The boat was used for taking visitors about the lake. Most of the passengers were guests at the Great Southern Hotel. The party started out this morning sightseeing. When the lower lake was reached it was found that a heavy wind from the northeast was blowing. Several other boats that had started over the same course put back.

The Model Saloon Again.
A so-called "temperance saloon" has been opened in Des Moines, Ia., by a man who owns fourteen other saloons of the same kind in the same city. The Willard W. C. T. U. has entered a protest to the city council, saying, "Such a saloon does a thousand times more harm to the youth of our city than all the other vile dens which make no effort to conceal the 'cloven hoof.'" The place is also charged with not having complied with the requirements of the chief of police.

The proprietor defends himself by saying that the place, from a temperance standpoint, has been an unqualified success, for "more cups of coffee than glasses of beer have been sold." It is amusing to note that Mida's Criterion is dashing cold water on the experiment; so with the W. C. T. U. protest and liquor trade sarcasm the temperance saloon will hardly survive. The Criterion says:

One of the stunts expected of the bartender—who, however, will be known as clerk—will be to lecture the applicant for a cocktail on the insidious effects of that delectable compound on his "innards," and at the same time laud the virtues of buttermilk, soda-water and other soft drinks. It is said that preaching has driven the working man out of the churches; will setting up a pulpit in the saloon not have a similar effect?

As innovation is the abolition of treating and the serving of only one drink to a customer at each visit; but the Criterion says, "Refuse to allow a man to treat or to buy more than one drink and he would at once hie to one of the Des Moines reformer's other fourteen saloons which are run wide open, and treat the crowd and order as many drinks as he could dispatch at a sitting. In short, the prohibition set on his orders at the model saloon would, as in the case of all prohibition, drive him to drink."

According to the liquor papers, all restrictions make saloons worse and prohibition would make drunkards of us all. The trade signs to be let alone!—The Union Signal.

ROGUE RIVER FRUIT LAND SELLS AT HIGH PRICES

One of the largest orchard deals made in this locality for several months was closed yesterday when C. F. Rowell, until recently a wholesaler and retail upholsterer in Cedar Rapids, Ia., and E. M. Soboda, a wholesale and retail coal dealer, also of Cedar Rapids, purchased from G. A. Morse his orchard tract, about four miles south of Medford and for which \$80,000 was paid.

There are 145 acres of land in the tract and of this fully 135 acres are set to fruit. This is in apples, pears and some prunes. Some of the trees are from 12 to 15 years old, while a few pear trees are only 4 or 5 years old. The whole orchard is now in the prime of bearing and it is estimated the fruit now on the trees will produce a net income of \$10,000.—Medford Tribune.

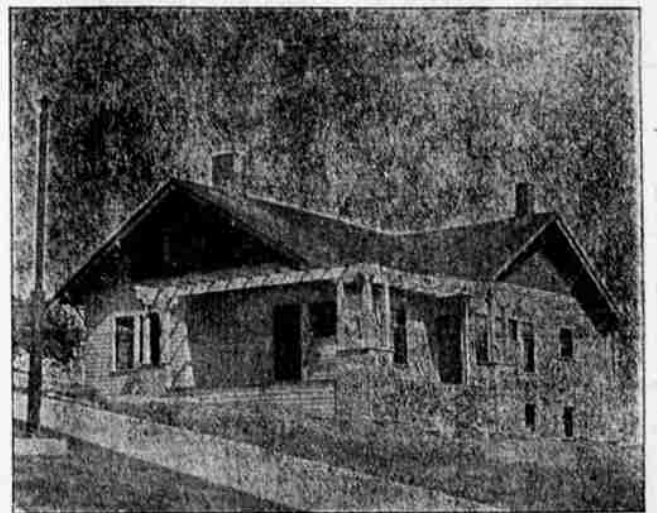
