TRAIN SERVICE THE WORST EVER.

Eugene train service is the worst it has been in years. We are to lose the Wendling service that was secured by the efforts of a committee of business men two years ago, at which time there was also made by the railroad officials a tentative promise to bring the Woodburn-Springfield train into Eugene. Also the Cottage Grove local has been rendered practically valueless by starting it out at an unearthly hour, and the "Flyer," our most convenient train, has been discontinued.

These changes make it necessary for our business men to begin the campaign for proper railroad recognition all over again, and no time should be lost in taking up the fight.

Senator LaFollette makes the startling assertion that 70 per cent. of the revenues of the United States are spent on the army and navy. We haven't much of an army and the greatest warships we build are out of date and nothing but scrap iron ten years after they are launched. But the same thing happens to the owner of any other expensive piece of machinery. There is the automobile for instance. WALLA WALLA CROP
5,000,000 BUSHELS

Walla Walla, Wash., June 3.—Indications at present are that the wheat crop in Walla Walla county this year will reach the 5,000,000-bushel mark. This estimate made by local grainmen is 1,500,000 bushels greater than the crop of 1908, but falls 500,000 bushels short of the crop of 1907, which was the greatest in the history of the country. In the light lands the yield has been slightly affected either by frost or the early hot spell; otherwise the yield would have been fully as large as in 1907.

Fall wheat is already fairly well made, while spring wheat is depending largely upon the weather of the next two weeks, but barring hot winds should measure fully up to expectations. With plenty of dry weather the harvest will begin shortly after the Fourth of July, and threshing outfits are already making preparations for their season, which will continue until the latter part of September.

TRIAL OF FAY ALLISON
HELD IN COURT TODAY

Cottage Grove Youth Being Tried on Serious Charge—Other Cases.

The trial of Fay Allison, a Cottage Grove youth, charged with statutory rape upon Ada Jackson, a 16-year-old girl, formerly residing at Cottage Grove, but now living at Medford, took up a greater portion of the time of the circuit court today. The following jury was chosen in the case: Alfred Doolittle, M. A. Fuller, Geo. M. Dillard, Wm. H. Fenton, J. R. Purkerson, P. L. Barber, E. H. Gomph, B. H. Dunlap, Grant Hendricks, Henry Chilson, M. F. Griggs and Geo. G. Gross.

The testimony in the case was completed this afternoon and the jury will probably go out some time this evening.

Jury Disagreed.

In the case of Edwards and Copenhaver vs. William R. Walker, to recover money on the sale of some timber land, the jury last evening reported that it could not agree and was discharged.

Verdict for Plaintiff.

In the case of A. A. Gibson vs. the Hurd Lumber and Navigation Co., to recover money for logs furnished the defendant, the jury last evening returned a verdict in favor of the plaintiff for \$147.80. The defendant was given 60 days to file a bill of exceptions.

Dunton Arraigned.

Vivian Dunton was arrested at his home in the McKenzie valley yesterday by Sheriff Bown and brought to Eugene last evening. He is charged with violating the local option law. He was arraigned this morning and will enter plea tomorrow at 9 a.m.
