FINES AND JAIL SENTENCES FOR BOOT-LEGGERS

Three men accused of the illicit sale of liquor, were sentenced by Judge Harris this morning. Mart Endicott, who was found guilty by a jury, was fined \$250 and sentenced to serve 30 days in jail. Jesse Eddy, who pleaded guilty after having first entered a plea of not guilty, was assessed \$100 and will serve 30 days in jail. Oscar Parsons, who pleaded guilty, was fined \$200 and was sentenced to remain 20 days in jail.

Pearl McDonald, also indicted for selling booze, this afternoon changed his plea of not guilty to that of guilty and will be sentenced later.

MUNICIPAL LEAGUE'S ADDRESS TO VOTERS

Attention Called to Leading Issue Before People at Monday's Election.

To the voters of Eugene:

At the special election to be held June 28, 1909, for the purpose of adopting or rejecting certain amendments to the city charter, it is important that some of the amendments should receive your approval. The city should be empowered to condemn real estate for municipal purposes. The present charter is defective in that respect. The amendment offered is designed to correct a previous amendment which was defective because no procedure was provided. The city is growing fast and it should have the power to acquire real estate both within and without the city limits, for municipal purposes such as water, light and gas.

city hall and a site therefor, should also be approved. The present city hall is located on the county's land and the county is demanding possession of it. The city should secure the site and build a city hall without delay. It is a necessity. Land will never be cheaper, but in all probability will be much higher, and every year's delay means an expense that will be ultimately greater for the taxpayer.

The amendment declaring all places to be a common nuisance where intoxicating liquors are kept for sale and providing for search and seizure should appeal to all who favor the efficient enforcement of the law. As it is, the officers are greatly handicapped in securing evidence against guilty persons, with the result that many flagrant violations of the law go unpunished. If this amendment carries, there is no reason why illicit selling should not be completely eliminated.

Another important amendment providing a small salary for the mayor and councilmen should pass. There is not a councilman who does not spend more of his time for the city than for his own private business. The chairman of the important committees give practically all of their time to the city. The city should not expect such services without at least partial remuneration. Whereas in former days the council met once a month it now meets two or three times a week and the sessions run far into the night. This amendment should pass and the council should meet in the afternoons.

The amendment providing a method for condemning land for streets and sewers should pass, for the reason that under the present charter it is very doubtful whether the city can condemn land for streets. The amendment offered was prepared by the charter commission which was composed of the best lawyers in Eugene and was drafted to correct the defect in the old charter.
