

SCOUR HILLS TO REST MURDEROUS BANDIT

B. C. Juen 29.—Bloodhounds and armed posses scour the hills south of Ashcroft in an effort to locate the bandit who held up and killed Constable Decker. His capture is imminent. When the two bandits landed, Constable Decker went down to arrest them. One of them with a pistol, saying:

"Now arrest us." A brief parley and Decker and the robber opened fire. The bandit fell dead. Decker went down, and the other robber seized a shotgun and fired at Decker's head.

Several fully armed men have been arrested, and are being held by the police. The gang who held up the Canadian Pacific train last week have been traced to the old mining tunnel where they will probably make their last stand.

The robber has not been identified.

CORONER'S JURY CHARGES EASTMAN WITH MURDER

St. Michaels, Md., June 28.—With the compromise verdict of the coroner's jury that Robert E. Eastman either killed, or was accessory to the murder of Edith May Woodfill, and the declaration of United States Attorney Taylor that he was through with the case, the strange dual tragedy became a closed incident today.

Four of the twelve jurors refused to sign the verdict, and the words "or accessory to the crime" were added to the draft, which, while approved by the majority, bluntly accused Eastman of the murder. The four dissenting jurors merely wished to protest, they said, against the manner in which the inquiry was conducted, declaring that much available evidence was not adduced.

PITTSBURG CARS RUN REGULARLY AFTER AGREEMENT

Pittsburg, June 29.—Following the settlement of the street car strike the cars are running in every division today.

An agreement, allowing discharged men proper hearing before superintendents and giving the assurance of the company that the secretary will shorten "swing runs" 50 per cent, was drawn up and signed. There will be no ratification meeting of the men.

SENATOR ALDRICH SUPPORTS CORPORATION TAX TO HEAD OFF PROPOSED INCOME TAX

Washington, June 29.—In the course of an answer to questions in the senate today, Aldrich said he would support a corporation tax amendment as a means of defeating an income tax. He expressed the opinion, however, that the corporation tax would be repealed after two years, or the rate materially lowered.

GALLERIES ARE CROWDED

The income tax question was then put aside to enable Tillman to present his amendment for a duty of ten cents a pound on tea.

The amendment was defeated, 18 to 55.

NO FURTHER CHANGE IN LUMBER SCHEDULE

Washington, June 28.—The Interstate Commerce Commission today refused to make any further modifications in its decision reached last summer in various Pacific Coast lumber cases. It holds that the rates which it then established are valid for only two years, and intimates that at the expiration of that time the whole question may be reopened.

GEORGE ROBBINS IS CHARGED WITH

Portland, June 28.—Arrested on a street corner here late yesterday on a warrant accusing him with murder, George Robbins, whose father's housekeeper, Mrs. Emaline Casto, was killed late Saturday afternoon in the Robbins' home near Hood River, Or., is today a prisoner in the latter town.

Constable Ganger, of Hood River, and Deputy Sheriff Morse, who traced young Robbins, returned with him on the late train last night, so as to avoid any demonstration at the depot when he arrived. The prisoner refused to answer questions, referring to consult a lawyer first. That the murder of Mrs. Casto was premeditated is now the belief of the Hood River county officials. Robbins was the motive.

The woman was killed by a large stone, with which the murderer crushed her skull. Mrs. Casto was working about the house, when William Robbins, her employer, left for town. Upon his return he found his housekeeper dead upon his bed. The fiend had taken from his victim \$50 in cash and a check for \$75.

MINING FOR GOLD ON BEACH NEAR FLORENCE

Several Men Are Making Good Wages—Have Been Working There Several Months

Reports say that a number of men are making good wages at mining on the beach above Heceta lighthouse, a few miles north of Florence. Some of them have been at work there for several months, and are said to be doing well. Gold is the principal article, but our informant understood they are finding other metals. Some of the early settlers in that section used to wash gold out of the sand on the beach, and other persons have occasionally worked at it for a time, but they did not find it very profitable, owing in part perhaps to their poor equipment and to the limited extent of the deposit from which they could obtain gold. One of the present party is a man who has had many years of experience in the mines, and he uses a process of his own to separate the gold from other substances. The party is said to be having good success and are finding the work quite profitable.—Florence West.

DEATH'S DAILY HARVEST FROM AUTO ACCIDENTS

Boy Killed in Portland—Two Dying in Seattle

Portland, June 29.—Walter Baseling, aged eleven, was today killed by an automobile driven by H. L. Keats, an automobile agent. He jumped out from behind an ice wagon directly in the path of the automobile and died in the hospital. Witnesses say Keats could not possibly have avoided the accident.

Run Down by Train. Seattle, June 29.—A Northern Pacific freight train early today ran down an automobile in which seven persons were riding near Georgetown. It is expected that Grace M. Thompson, aged 21, will die, and Chauffeur Carl Schott is badly injured. His skull is fractured and he is in a serious condition.

DISSENSION IN REFORMER'S RANKS

Call Makes Vicious Attack on Ex-Mayor of San Francisco

San Francisco, June 28.—The Call astonished the town by printing on its main news page a digest of the expose of the spy ballot scheme, devised by the Good Government League, which originally appeared in Saturday's Chronicle. There are two articles. One, signed by George A. Vansmith, the Call's chief political reporter, after giving a resume of the Chronicle article, goes on severely to score the Good Government League for the recourse to Russian spy methods. Then what makes its regular readers gasp follows. It says:

"Phelan for Mayor. James D. Phelan, the reformer, is a candidate for mayor. His name was put at the head of the 'people's ticket.' He might run well at a make-believe election, and a popular demand too strong to be gainsaid by a willing candidate might be developed. The other theory is that the main purpose of the scheme was to secure a challenge list to be used in securing trial juries in future graft cases.

"Whatever the purpose, the apparent results are more than two-fold. Phelan's chances for becoming mayor are no better than they were, and the Good Government League will profit from the scheme in about the same degree as Phelan.
