

**UNION HIGH NO. 1  
CHOOSES KILPATRICK**

**Winner of Beekman Prize Will  
Take Position at Pleas-  
ant Hill**

Union high school No. 1, of Pleasant Hill, in the state of Oregon as well as in Lane county, has signed contracts for the second year's work and the directors expect that thirty or more pupils will attend the high school. Earl Kilpatrick, the prominent University of Oregon editor, orator, debater and scholar, was chosen yesterday by the board for teacher.

The studies for the term of nine months, beginning the latter part of September, will be the regular state prescribed course of three years. Last year the pupils were not far enough advanced to take the whole three years, but this year there will probably be a class of graduates.

The directors of the district are the chairmen of five districts that at one time composed old No. 1 in Lane county. W. L. Bristow, of No. 1 in Lane county, is chairman, and the other members are A. T. Miller, of No. 3; R. E. Williams, of No. 103; S. L. Fering, of No. 143, and J. F. Brewer, of No. 29.

Miss Clara Corum was teacher last year. The school has a library of considerable value, and is considered by educators as a forerunner in rural education.

**FIRST AUTOMOBILE TO GO  
OVER SIUSLAW ROAD**

**Eugene Machine Causes Natives  
of Western Lane to Stare  
and Wonder**

The first automobile to come in over the stage road from Eugene to Mapleton, and the second horseless carriage seen at this place, arrived here Tuesday morning, says the Florence West.

It is a Rambler roadster of 34 horsepower, owned by the Willamette Auto Co., of Eugene, and was driven by W. R. Letts.

The passengers were E. H. McAllister, state fish warden, Mrs. McAllister and Miss Mary Van Winkle of Eugene.

They followed the stage road from Eugene to the mouth of Lake Creek on Monday and then turned up hat stream to the state salmon hatchery, arriving there six hours from the time they left Eugene. The distance is about 55 miles.

Tuesday morning the party, accompanied by Superintendent Simmons, made the trip from the hatchery to Mapleton, a distance of 15 miles, in an hour and twenty minutes.
