The Guard has time and again called attention to the benefits that would follow the organization of a building and loan association in Eugene. Such local associations have greatly assisted in the work of homebuilding in other cities and would be equally successful here, once the plan was put in operation. We understand that an association has been incorporated here and will soon be organized and put in working order. If this is the case wage-earners and salaried employees will find it to their advantage to make it the repository for their savings every month, even if they have no immediate intention of building. Their money will be safe there and will earn moderate interest, and should they wish to build a home it will enable them to do so, paying the loan off in easy monthly payments.

There is no doubt but Eugene will in time adopt a plan of city government modelled after the Des Moines system, in which the mayor and councilmen will be paid for their services, each of them becoming the responsible head of a department of the municipality. Municipal ownership, to succeed, will require clear-headed business management and it cannot be expected that unpaid councilmen will give the business of the city the time and attention it requires when we have a light and power plant in operation in addition to a water system. A mayor and three councilmen paid to attend to the city's business and each held definitely responsible for the conduct of a particular department would be a money-saver to the people who pay the taxes.

ANOTHER RESORT WITH
BUILDING OF RAILROADSalt Creek Springs Are Both
Hot and Have Mineral Contents

C. J. Neal, E. M. Neal and P. S. Warner have a lease on the mineral springs twelve miles above Hazel Dell on Salt Creek, from the government, and are waiting for the railroad to be built to their site. When regular service is once established they plan to turn the springs into a pleasure resort.

As the springs now exist they are much used for baths. The water has never been analyzed, but the lessees believe that they will be found to be as valuable as London, and other Northwest resorts. They are hot as well as possessing mineral contents.

ALSEA TRAIL
TO BE COMPLETED
THIS SEASONLink Connecting Siuslaw and
Alsea Districts Is Now
About Half Done

A. E. Cahoon, superintendent of the Siuslaw forest reserve, stated today that the trail between the Alsea and Siuslaw rivers would be finished this season. Work began last fall and at this time about 14 miles of the link has been completed.

This trail is 12 feet wide in almost every place, and while not actually built for wagons, the grades are no greater than the ordinary wagon road. Almost any of the forest service paths can be turned into roads by grading. The contracts for the completion of the trail will probably be let about July 1.

Another link of trail that is being planned in the Siuslaw reserve is between Gardiner, Oregon, and a fork of the Smith river called the Wildcat. This trail, when constructed, will afford the settlers on Wildcat a much easier route to the little seaport town. The department will probably let contracts about August 1.

Close of Fiscal Year.

Tomorrow, June 30, the fiscal year of the forest departments will be closed. About \$15,000 has been spent in the Siuslaw reserve, the largest part of which has gone for improvements that benefit settlers as much as trappers or hunters or rangers. In the state of Oregon the government has distributed about \$100,000. Of this amount \$40,000 went to the common school fund and roads and \$60,000 for salaries and improvements. In some counties of Pacific coast states the income from the forest ranges is more than the entire taxation.

Hawley's Mistake

Superintendent Cahoon says Congressman Hawley has forgotten the laws when he writes that the government has taken much good agricultural land from settlement. As the forest reserves are now organized, any land in a forest reserve that can be shown to be more valuable for agricultural purposes than anything else can be homesteaded by application to the land office and the forest service department.

Small Sales of Timber

So far in the forest service department of the Siuslaw the sales of timber have been small. In one, however, two million feet were sold.

Several new appointments have been made by Superintendent Cahoon. Fourteen men are now in the mountains of western Lane, Douglas and Lincoln counties. The great portion of the work is not watching forest fires, but protecting forests from timber thieves, collecting and assigning pasturage and making collections, and cutting out trails.

Homesteaders With Diamonds

Mr. Cahoon says "the government is simply saving the forests for the people. The state does not contribute a cent to the expense, but receives considerable money from the profits, besides the lasting result. Down in the Siletz Indian reserve we have had some striking examples of the way people take advantage of the government. Out there on claims that had 15,000,000 feet of timber, people from Michigan, a doctor from San Francisco, and others, sometimes with diamond rings on their fingers and plenty of money, would take a homestead. Everything they ate had to be packed in at the rate of 5 cents a pound. Yet these same people continually stir up sentiment against the policy of forest preservation."

RAILROAD EXTENSION
CASES TIMBER SALES

Supervisor Seltz Says There Have Been More Applications in Two Weeks Than Whole Year

"More applications for the purchase of timber have been made during the last two weeks, since the Natron railroad extension is assured, than during the whole year before," said C. R. Seltz, superintendent of the forest reserve that takes in the eastern end of Lane county and neighboring regions in the Cascade mountains. "The proposed building of the railroad up the Willamette has created a veritable boom."

Mr. Seltz did not care to discuss who the applicants were, and therefore it is not known whether any are agents for Harriman or not.

The McKenzie-Willamette Trail. "About fourteen miles of trail has been completed on the route selected from McKenzie Bridge to the Willamette. When finished the route will be fifty or sixty miles in length. As the snow is so late in the section traversed, and as the country is so rough, we expect to build only six miles of trail this year, and proportionate distances in other years," he said.

There are now twenty-four men on regular duty under Supervisor Seltz. Almost as many more are working on trails as extras. Among the latest assignments or appointments are Marvin Hurd, of Eugene, and George Landis, of Cottage Grove.

BETTER TRAIN SERVICE
PROMISED EUGENE AND
OTHER VALLEY POINTSIt Will Be Better Than Ever Before
When Change Is Made,
About Next Sunday

The Southern Pacific Co., realizing that under the new schedule Eugene and upper valley points have very poor train service to Portland, an announcement of another change has just been made at the Portland headquarters.

This change is about as radical as the first one, but this time is for the better and after the new schedule goes into effect, which will be about next Sunday, July 4, Eugene people will have a better service than ever before.

The Cottage Grove local will be changed to an evening train and will pass through Eugene about 5:40 o'clock, reaching Portland at about 10:30 at night. No. 14, which now passes through at 5:30 in the morning, will leave at 6:30, reaching Portland about 11 a. m. This will give Eugene people a passenger service leaving here at 2:43 in the morning, 6:30 in the evening, 12:22 in the afternoon and 5:40 in the evening.
