STREET CAR LINE OUT WEST ELEVENTH STREET
 Extension to Fair Grounds Will Be Built by That Route, Probably This Summer

While A. Welch, vice-president and general manager of the Portland, Eugene & Eastern railway, was in the city a few days ago, he gave out the information that the street car line would in all probability be extended to the fair grounds this summer and that the route taken would be out West Eleventh street, branching off the main line at the corner of Willamette street. The line will extend straight out West Eleventh street to the grounds and then turn to the north and extend to the city limits, the line from down the valley coming into the city that way. It is also probable that a loop may be built, a line running down West Fifth street and connecting with the Willamette street line at the Hotel Griggs.
