The Eugene & Western Railway Company is preparing for active work on its line to the Siuslaw; the Welch people are making the final arrangements to begin extension work in Eugene and northward toward Salem from this city; the Southern Pacific opens bids for the extension of their road from the main line at Eugene to Klamath Falls on July 10. Verily, there is something doing in this neck of the woods.

Business in all lines is better in Eugene than ever before. One prominent drygoods merchant said yesterday that his business for June exceeded that of the corresponding month of June last year by \$2000, and a hardware store reports business for May \$5000 in excess of that of May last year. Nearly every firm in the city could make a similar report. And we have just begun to grow!

WOMAN SUFFRAGE
CONVENTION MEETSRev. Anna B. Shaw Delivers the
Annual Address—Fac-
tion Fight

Seattle, July 1.—The forty-first annual convention of the National American Woman Suffrage Association opened its sessions in Plymouth Church this afternoon, with all of the general officers present, and nearly all of the famous leaders of the movement. Mrs. Emma Smith Devoe, president of the Washington association, welcomed the delegates, and Mrs. Mary S. Sperry, president of the California association, made the national response. In the absence of the international president, Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, National president Anna H. Shaw delivered the annual report on international suffrage work. She reviewed the impetus which the suffrage cause had received in the United States, in common with the countries in Europe, as the result of the great Democratic wave which is sweeping over the nations, aided by the progressive tactics of the women of England during the last three years. Mrs. Shaw took up the House tariff bill, in which the duty on women's wearing apparel is greatly increased, adding more and more burdens upon women, who have no power whatever and no voice in regulating the tariff or in the expenditure of the money which is wrested from them.

The inconsistency of the Government, whose very existence is a protest against unjust tax regulations imposing a more grievous burden upon its own citizens is a serious commentary upon either the common sense or the justice of American manhood, she said.

Split in Banks.
Seattle, July 1.—The National executive committee of the American Woman Suffrage Association, which this morning had under advisement what action it should take in regard to the demands of the Spokane faction which yesterday was unseated in the state session, adjourned at 1:30 o'clock after a meeting lasting four hours, in which the officers could come to no decision. The matter will be gone over again at a gathering of the executives called for 4 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

STATE OF OREGON
SUES CORPORATIONSThe Attorney-General Filed
Suits Against Several
Yesterday

Salem, Or., July 2.—Suits were filed by the state of Oregon through Attorney-General Crawford yesterday against the Wells Fargo Express company and the Standard Oil company to secure thousands of dollars for the state, alleged to be due as a gross earnings tax.

Suits were filed for the collection of the 3 per cent tax upon their gross earnings in the state, under the provisions of the initiative act of 1906, dating back to June 26, 1906, and up to January 1, 1909, aggregating a total of \$29,846.42, with interest at six per cent and costs of the suit.

The Pacific States Telegraph and Telephone Company contested the validity of this law about a year ago, and the act was sustained by the supreme court on appeal. It involves the question of the constitutionality of the initiative and referendum amendment to the state constitution. Attorney-General Crawford is also preparing a similar suit against the Union Oil company, whose delinquency under this law dates back to June 26, 1906, but the state treasurer has not completed from this corporation as yet.

FORMATION AND
LINE OF BIG
PARADE MONDAYRoute of Pageant Outlined—
Headed by Speaker D'Arcy
and Officers of the Day

The big spectacular parade on Monday, July 5, will probably be the finest of its kind ever seen here. The committees have been working diligently on the floats and many business men are arranging special displays to be hauled in the line.

The parade will form on Olive street between West Fifth and West Eighth. It will proceed east on Fifth to Willamette street; south on Willamette to Eleventh; east on East Eleventh to Pearl; north on Pearl to East Ninth; west on Ninth to Charnelton; north on Charnelton to West Eighth, and east on Eighth to the park squares where the parade will be disbanded and where the exercises of the day will be held.

The Formation.
The parade will be headed by Hon. P. H. D'Arcy, speaker of the day. Mayor J. D. Matlock, president of the day, and members of the city council in open carriages. These will be followed by the Eugene band; then come the two companies of militia; the G. A. R.; Miss Emma Travis as Goddess of Liberty; thirteen little girls on a float, representing the first thirteen states, followed by ladies on horseback representing the remainder of the states; Miss Marguerite Dunn, as Columbia; Miss Minnie Chambers as Justice; the ladies of the G. A. R.; the W. R. C.; the Salem band; the Woodmen of the World; business floats; manufacturing floats, the rear to be brought up by a steam callopie.

Day Fireworks.
A new and novel feature of the celebration will be a series of day fireworks in the park at two o'clock in the afternoon. They are something new in Eugene, although common in the larger cities.

On Sunday afternoon a sacred concert will be given by the band, beginning at 3 o'clock.

STREET FRONTAGESecures Ben Mulkey Property,
Occupied by Boddy's
Cigar Store

Fifteen feet frontage on Willamette street, occupied by a one-story brick business building, has sold for \$9400, which indicates the value of Eugene real estate at the present time in the business district. The property in question is the Ben Mulkey building occupied by Boddy's cigar store. Hon. Allen Eaton was the purchaser.

Mr. Eaton is advertising that he will go out of business, being forced out of his present quarters, and judging from that, he will not occupy the premises he has bought with his book and art store, at the present, at any rate.

W. E. Boddy, proprietor of the cigar store, has been given notice to vacate the building by the first of September. Mr. Eaton will rebuild the front of the structure, putting in a modern store front.

AMENDMENTS GO
IN FORCE WITH
PROCLAMATION

To the People of Eugene—A Proclamation

A special election duly ordered and held in the city of Eugene June 28, 1909, there were submitted to the voters for their approval or rejection certain amendments to the city charter.

1. To amend the charter of the City of Eugene by adding Section 125, authorizing the Common Council to acquire, appropriate and condemn real estate, water rights and right-of-way for a water works system, electric lighting plant and all other municipal purposes. The total number of votes cast for said amendment was 521. There were 531 votes for and 290 votes against the amendment; it was therefore carried by a majority of 241, and I therefore declare the said amendment to be in full force and effect from this date as a part of the charter of the City of Eugene.

2. To amend sub-division 18 of Section 48 of the City of Eugene, so as to grant to the Council the power and authority to license, tax and regulate and prohibit the sale of intoxicating liquors in the City of Eugene; to declare all places where intoxicating liquors are kept for sale to be common nuisances, and to provide for search and seizure. The total number of votes cast for and against the said amendment was 523, 436 votes were cast for and 287 votes were cast against said amendment, so that it carried by a majority of 49, and I therefore declare said amendment to be in full force and effect as a part of the charter of the City of Eugene from this date.

3. Shall Sections 86, 87 and 97 be amended so as to provide a legal method of condemning land for streets and sewers? The total number of votes cast for and against said amendment was 791; 522 for and 269 against it, so that said amendment carried by a majority of 253 votes, and I therefore declare said amendment to be in full force and effect as a part of the charter of the City of Eugene from this date.

4. To amend Section 25 of the charter of the City of Eugene so as to confer upon the Common Council the power to prescribe the qualifications of electors at municipal elections. The total number of votes cast for and against said amendment was 765, of which 384 were cast for the amendment and 381 against it, so that said amendment carried by three votes, and I therefore declare said amendment to be in full force and effect as a part of the charter of the City of Eugene from this date.
