NEW YORK WORRIED OVER PROBLEM OF THE UNEMPLOYED

Guard special service.

New York, July 3.—What to do with the man out of work is the subject of an investigation undertaken by the Wainwright commission on unemployed, which today received the report of a sub-commission on the scope of the labor of the body. The commission was appointed jointly by Governor Hughes, Lieutenant-Governor Wicks and Speaker Wadsworth of the Assembly. The commissioners will report to the State Legislature on the causes of unemployment in New York and other industrial centers, and also on the dearth of labor in the agricultural districts of the Empire state.

Clermont is Ready. One of the strangest vessels at a New York shipyard in many decades is nearing completion at Staten Island. It is an exact replica of the Clermont, Robert Fulton's first steamboat, and will be exhibited at the Hudson-Fulton celebration this fall. Only the installation of the engine and the finishing of the interior remains to be done.

Shipbuilders declare that in spite of the strange shape of the craft—the bottom of the vessel is absolutely flat its entire length, the sides are almost perpendicular and the bows wedge-shaped—she is remarkably seaworthy. The engine is especially queer in appearance. Except for certain safety devices required by law, the new Clermont will be exactly like the vessel in which Fulton made his first trip up the Hudson.

As the date set for the Hudson-Fulton celebration in September draws nearer, it becomes increasingly evident that the affair will offer the most impressive and spectacular pageantry in the country's history. One of the latest phases of the celebration is the formation of a Fulton-Hudson Publishing Company, which will bring out a magnificent literary memorial of the event, presenting a review of the Hudson River Valley from its discovery in 1609 to the present day. The contributors include practically all the men and women identified in any way with the commercial and artistic development of the Hudson of the present.

Is This Justice? There are times when the unregenerate feel inclined to rear the language from the eyes of Miss Justice and beseech that estimable lady to sit up and take notice of what is being done in her name. One of

these periods of discontent with the administration of alleged justice arises from a consideration of the case of Edward W. Vanderbilt.

Some years ago, to avoid being exact, Mr. Vanderbilt, a man of some means, married a famous spiritualist medium named Mrs. Pepper. That was a matter of taste, and the conveyance of some of his lands to his wife a matter of inclination.

The daughter of Mr. Vanderbilt looked upon his marriage to a "medium" as sufficient proof of a loosed condition or cerebral activities. She appealed, successfully, to the courts to have her paternal ancestor declared non compos bughouse. Criminal action was then brought against Mrs. Vanderbilt on the allegation that she had used illegal influences on her husband in order to obtain a portion of his property.

Lately another commission examined Mr. Vanderbilt and declared that he is sane, and the criminal proceedings against Mrs. Vanderbilt were dismissed as baseless. At this point, according to the viewpoint of the man up a tree, is where justice slipped a cog.

Mr. Vanderbilt is to pay the costs of the attempt to have him declared insane, fees to the lunacy commissioners, the expenses incurred by his daughter in the legal proceedings brought against him, stenographer's fees and a large sum to the commissioner in charge of his property during the prosecution, the whole aggregating thousands of dollars.

Savings Banks Pay. All the savings banks of New York will pay their semi-annual dividends to depositors during the month. This disbursement, which is at the rate of 4 per cent per annum, will go to the comparatively poor but thrifty inhabitants of the city who constitute the patrons of the savings institutions. The condition of these banks affords a hopeful criterion for the prosperity of the great masses of New Yorkers.

Perhaps the largest of this class of dividend disbursements was that paid this week by the Bowers Savings Bank, the great East Side institution. This was the 150th consecutive payment of the bank since its organization and rounded out the seventy-fifth year of its existence. It was organized in 1834. Seventy-five years ago today it had fifty depositors and little more than \$2,000 in the little trunk that constituted its safety deposit vault.

Only Change is in Cottage Grove Local, Which Goes North in the Evening

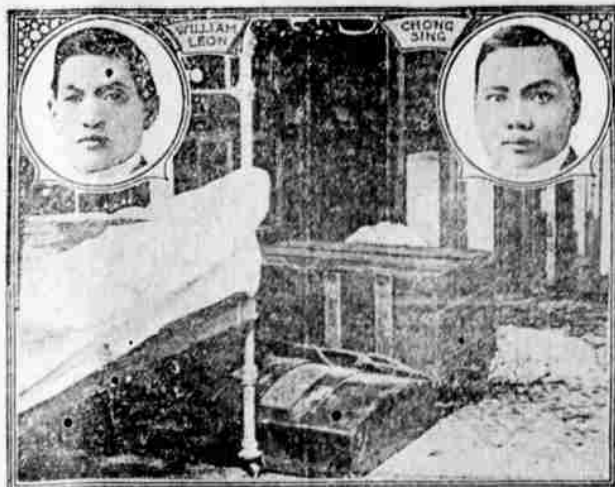
