UNIVERSITY TO HAVE ATTENDANCE OF 800 STUDENTS

Registrar Tiffany Makes Esti-
mate — 80 in Sum-
mer School

"The University of Oregon will
have between seven and eight hun-
dred students in the regular depart-
ments," said Registrar A. R. Tiffany
this morning when discussing college
attendance. "We expect a fresh-
man class of three hundred, and the
other students will bring the total
up to my estimate."

This forecast does not include the
music departments, in which there
will probably be another hundred
registered, who are not counted in
the regular attendance. This year
there was about that number of out-
side students in the musical depart-
ment. In the regular undergraduate
departments there were about 550
students.

Summer School.
The summer school attendance has
passed the first estimates made by
Registrar Tiffany. It is now above
the eighty mark, a point which is as
high as it will go.

Of this number about sixty-five
are women. A number of old stu-
dents are taking the work, for they
receive college credit.

New Apparatus.
Steward L. H. Johnson states that
\$2000 worth of apparatus has been
ordered for the chemistry, physics,
biological, and psychological labora-
tories. The orders for the engin-
eering department have not been
made.

ATTENDED GREAT BAPTIST CONVENTION AT PORTLAND

Rev. and Mrs. O. C. Wright Ar-
rive Home This Morning—
Largest Attendance

Rev. and Mrs. O. C. Wright re-
turned this morning from Portland,
where they have been attending the
Northern Baptist convention the past
eight days. This convention was
considered one of the most notable
in the history of the Baptist church.
Though far removed from the
East and Middle West, where the
large constituency of the churches
live, the attendance was the largest
in its history. The White Temple was
crowded at the day sessions and at
times overflow meetings had to be
provided at a nearby church for the
night sessions. Harry Pratt Judson,
L. L. D., president of the Chicago
University, presided with superb
grace, and was re-elected for another
year. Many other distinguished lay-
men, as well as ministers, contributed
to make the sessions inspiring. The
convention expressed itself strongly
on many moral questions, among
which was reform in the Congo.

Perhaps one of the most stirring
addresses was when Herbert Johnson
presented the cause of these unfor-
tunate natives. Missionaries from all
parts of the world told of their work
and at times electrified the vast au-
dience by accounts of wonderful vic-
tories. William Carey, a great-grand-
son of William Carey, the founder of
the modern missionary movement,
was an honored speaker. A feature
of the convention was the congrega-
tional singing, said by many to be ex-
ceptional, which reflects credit upon
the pastor of the Eugene church for
his ability to direct so large an audi-
ence.

The convention will be held in Chi-
cago next year, but the verdict of all
was that in order to equal Portland
some genius of organizing ability
equal to Dr. Brougher, to whom most
is due for the perfect arrangements,
will have to be in charge.
