LIPTON ASKS CONCESSION

Wants Boats to be of Stronger Build in Frame.

London, July 2.—If the officials of the New York Yacht club will make moderate concessions to Sir Thomas Lipton in the size of a chal- lenger for the America's cup, it is more than possible that the veteran sportsman will make another at- tempt to lift the coveted trophy next year.

Sir Thomas contends that it is practically impossible to construct a craft on sufficient delicate lines to have a chance in the race and at the same time make her strong enough to withstand the rigorous ocean trip to American waters.

It is said here that Lipton does not want to be embarrassed again by a refusal of his challenge, and that he awaits an expression of opinion by the American yachtmen.

If, it is thought, they evince a willingness to concede a few minor points in construction and size, the same Irishman will issue a challenge immediately.

VANDERBILT'S LOVE IS ALWAYS FATAL

Two Women Have Already Killed Themselves Be- cause of It.

New York.—"Mme. Ruiz was the second woman who killed herself within a year or so for love of Al- fred Vanderbilt.

"She, after all, was only a 'blind' behind which he conducted his real love affairs—with the first woman who killed herself, a young matron of a splendid New York family."

These statements, part of a story that is absolutely startling, were made here today by an American so- ciety woman, who was commenting upon the suicide in London of the

pretty divorcee, who shot herself after the young millionaire allowed his attentions to her to grow lax, writes Vance Thompson in a special cable from Paris.

The society woman, whose home is in New York and who is a close personal friend of the former Mrs. Alfred Vanderbilt, declares that what she told is no secret to mem- bers of the Vanderbilt set in New York, although "outsiders" have not been aware of it.

"If a woman loves Alfred Vander- bilt," she said, "she might as well make up her mind to take poison or blow her brains out. Why there isn't a woman in the younger set in New York who doesn't believe that he has the evil eye."

"Two women have killed them- selves for him already, and we are all asking each other which one will be the next."

The New York woman then ex- plained her declaration that Mr. Vanderbilt's affair with Mme. Ruiz was only a "blind."

"Poor little Ruiz!" she said. "She was merely a pawn in the game of love. All the women in Alfred Van- derbilt's set knew that and risked named Ruiz accordingly. They called her 'alibi.'"

"The only woman with whom he ever really was in love was a young matron prominent in New York. But he was married, and so was this woman, and their meetings might have caused unpleasant comment."

"Therefore, this girl who killed herself in London was induced to pose as his innamorata. That was even before she became Mme. Ruiz—when she was simply a pretty and popular member of the upper ten- derloin."

"Her marriage—she didn't want to wed—was due to the insistence of young Vanderbilt. Soon there- after she began to pose as his fa- vorite, and he allowed his associa- tion with her to become known. She was to accept his vows, to ride and drive his horses, and to accompany him to midnight suppers, all in order that

NEAR-BEER PRODUCTS PROVE INTOXICATING

Salem Brand Said to Show 3.58 Per Cent, Roseburg 3.34, of Alcohol

Albany, Or., July 2.—Near-beer is under the ban in Albany and Linn county. The analysis is said to have shown that Melas, the product of the Salem Brewing Company, showed 3.58 per cent of alcohol, and the Roseburg product about 3.34 per cent. Anything with over two per cent is a violation of the law.

All those arrested here charged with the sale of near-beer were found guilty and paid their fines. All the defendants said they were ignorant that these drinks were in- toxicating, and expected to be pro- tected under the guaranty of the makers. This will effect the sale of these drinks in all the counties.

LUMBER MARKET LIVENS ON SOUND

C. B. & Q. Buys 1,500,000 Feet from One Mill; Navy- Yard Needs 445,000

Seattle, July 2.—The Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad dur- ing the last two days has closed con- tracts for nearly 1,500,000 feet of lumber with one Washington mill. Practically all this lumber is for immediate delivery at the company's shops, to be used for box car build- ing material. The Puget Sound Navy Yard is in the market for one of the largest bills of lumber ever called for by that yard, 445,000 feet.

The shut-down was due to a strike of yardmen, who asked a wage raise from \$1.75 to \$2. The strike spread to all the mill em- ployees, a general increase of 25 cents a day being demanded. When the mills resume \$2 will be paid yard- men but no other increases are al- lowed.

CELEBRATE DAY THROUGHOUT NATION

In Many Places the Program Will Continue for Three Days

New York, July 3.—New York's Fourth of July celebration began this morning and will continue with unabated vigor tomorrow and Mon- day. Thousands of people are leav- ing the city. Several accidents have already been reported and the hospi- tals are prepared for the annual Fourth of July rush. All the fire- fighting companies in the city are also ready for a busy day.

The Stock Exchange and the Cot- ton and Coffee exchanges are closed this morning for a triple holiday. Many stores and business places closed for the day and practically all business was suspended at noon.

Among the sporting events which attracted great interest today was the start of the Brooklyn Yacht club's 325 mile deep sea race for the Richard Crocker cup. The New York Motor Boat club will have a race to Albany and return, starting tonight. Many sporting events of minor im- portance are on the day's schedule. A big carnival was opened today at Bath Beach and attracted many New Yorkers, while the rush to Coney Is- land and other nearby resorts to- morrow is expected to break all records, if the weather is favorable.

At National Capital.

Washington, July 3.—Washington today began the celebration of the nation's birthday in a quiet way, but the real celebration will not take place until Monday and will be of the safe and sane variety. Accord- ing to reports received from over the country, the movement for a "painless" Fourth has no wide ad- herence, and in Philadelphia, Chic- go, Pittsburg and many other big cities it will be put into practical effect. Notwithstanding, it is es- timated that about \$20,000,000 will go up in smoke within the next few days. This is for fireworks and ex- plosives alone, and does not include the conflagrations that will result. Last year seventy-two were killed and 2,736 wounded during the 4th of July celebrations throughout the country.

Reports from diplomatic represen- tatives abroad state that the Fourth will be more generally celebrated by Americans in foreign lands than ever before. Especially noteworthy

will be the observances in Denmark, London, Paris, Rome, Berlin and the City of Mexico.

Danish-American Celebrations. Copenhagen, July 3.—More than a thousand Danish-Americans are at Aarhus today and will participate in the celebration of the Fourth of July at the Danish National Ex- position.

This is the first time that an at- tempt has been made to have a July Fourth celebration in a foreign coun- try conducted by naturalized Ameri- can citizens descendants from that country. The object is to afford Scandinavians an opportunity to learn the truth about the United States, a land that many of their people have made their homes and learned to love as their own country.

Six Days of Festivities. Plattsburg, N. Y., July 3.—For six days, beginning tomorrow with re- ligious observances, this region will be the scene of spectacular festi- vities in commemoration of the tercen- tenary of the white settlement of the Lake Champlain section under the lead of the French explorer after whom the lake is named. Thou- sands of visitors are already pour- ing into the towns bordering on the lake and many reunions of old time Champlain citizens were held today.
