WILD HORSE JUMPS

ON MAN'S FACE,
INJURING HIM BADLY

Henry Davis, Broncho Buster,
Now in Hospital With
Lacerated Countenance

Henry Davis lies on a cot in the General hospital suffering from a horribly lacerated face as the result of a vicious horse jumping on him yesterday during an exhibition of broncho-busting at the old baseball grounds on South Willamette street. Davis and others had advertised to give an exhibition of dare-devil riding and broncho-busting. Hardly had the exhibition begun when Davis was thrown from a little sorrel horse forlornly to the ground. Before he could arise the infuriated horse jumped upon his face with both fore feet. Attendants and bystanders ran to the man's assistance to find him bleeding profusely and apparently his whole face crushed in. Physicians were summoned and the man was taken to the General hospital nearby. It was found that no bones of the face were crushed, but there is an awful wound clear across the face and below the nose. Davis is resting easily today and will perhaps be able to be out in a few days in the opinion of Dr. Cheshire.

Arthur C. Langham is the Victim of a Celebration Explosion

Louisville, Ky., July 5.—Arthur Granville Langham, a well-known financier, and president of the Provident Life Assurance Society, died at Seymour, Indiana, today at the home of his brother-in-law, John J. Peter, from the effects of the delayed explosion of a giant cracker which he had picked up to relight, believing the fuse to be defective. His hand was torn frightfully and the concussion was so great that he became unconscious and died.

Langham is an uncle of the Baroness Speck von Sternberg, widow of the former German ambassador, and Countess deFairmount, wife of the naval attaché of the French embassy at Washington. His widow is in Europe visiting the Baroness von Sternberg.
