READY FOR SIUSLAW RAILROAD WORK

In a day or two more the soliciting committees will be ready for an active campaign for stock subscriptions to the Eugene-Siuslaw railroad. The movement this time will be carried on along absolutely business-like lines. It is proposed to go right ahead and build the road just as fast as it is possible to build it, and when the funds are exhausted to issue bonds for its completion. The plan presents the only possible method of securing the construction of the road, according to those who have spent the most time in going over the situation, and it will succeed beyond a doubt if everybody who should help will take an interest in the movement and help push it along.

It should be borne in mind that this is a popular movement for the good of the entire community, in which no one's personal interests will be allowed to take precedence, and that those who have been active in promoting the enterprise for the past year will receive no pay, either in stock or money, for their services. It is simply the outgrowth of a determined effort to do something for Eugene that will place it on a foundation for future growth and prosperity.

All that need be said in advocacy of this railroad movement is that we need a railroad through the timber belt and dairying country to the west that will terminate at navigable water—everybody admits this to be the case. We can secure such a road if we will put up our money and go to work upon it. It is up to the people to say by their subscriptions to stock whether they desire a railroad to the sea.

RUNS THE WHOLE TOWN

W. J. Pilkington, a newspaper man, has taken charge of all the business affairs of the town of Dexter, Iowa, with a population of 800, and will run the newspaper, and every business enterprise in the village, for seven months, according to the Pendleton Tribune. Guy Pogus, an experienced general line business man, has been taken into the management of each of the stores by Editor Pilkington. At the end of seven months he declares that the profits will be doubled. His newspaper is bulging over with advertising matter paid for at living rates, and as several of the business men are members of the city council he has taken charge of the city affairs, cleaned the streets and passed many needed ordinances. His first month's showing has been highly gratifying. Mr. Pilkington believes in advertising and not keeping out of a single issue of the paper. The paper impresses one that there is business in Dexter, and his efforts are attracting attention over the Middle West. All classes of merchants advertise in Dexter, the hardware men and grocers, the dry goods men, the clothiers and all classes of business.

HAY PRICES RISING
UPON ANTICIPATION

Short Crops and Rumor Make Farmers Confident of Their Position

Prices for hay are rising very fast, having already approached the \$20 mark in Eugene. The question of price seems to be the least bothersome for some buyers, who have not been able to get any hay yet, and Young, the Springfield livery man, said this morning that the farmers seemed to be holding for \$30, and added that they had not been able to buy for their barn. Springfield is excited over the Nation extension and the farmers of that vicinity are expecting that the short crop will force prices to unheard-of heights. However, the custom of contractors to ship in stock food unless local rates are reasonable is likely to hold the market down to at least a sane figure, even though 2000 men go to work by August.

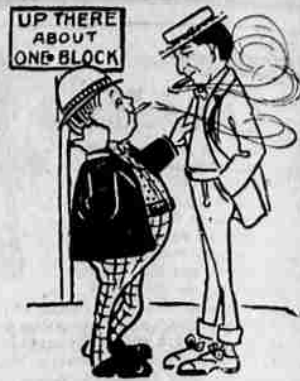
