BALL TEAM TO GO TO JAPAN

Japanese Colleges Will Take Oregon in Early Season.
The University baseball team will take the proposed trip to Japan, if the faculty of the University will permit the absence of the team from April 29, 1919, until the end of the college year. Harper Jamison, manager of the 1919 team, has received a letter from the associated college nines in Japan stating that the college nines of the Oriental empire can give the Oregon team games in what is known as the early season.
President Campbell is favorable to the trip, believing that a tour would be worth a year of college. He also

believes that the action of the faculty will be favorable.
The baseball squad had a proposition to go this year, but the playing seasons in Japan are such that they conflict with the college work here.
Japan has a wet season in the middle of the summer, which divides the year into spring and autumn periods.
Thomas Kelly will continue to coach the Oregon team, and with his second season should put out an aggregation that will be hard to defeat in a series.

A FLY IN THE MILK MAY MEAN DEATH BY TYPHOID

A. R. Sweetser, professor of biology at the University, is trying to change the name of the common house fly to typhoid fly. His purpose is to create a prejudice against the insect that will make people in general abhor the creature.
"Every time a fly lights on a piece of bread it leaves thousands and thousands of germs, a great many of which may be pathogenic or dangerous to man," says the professor.
"When a fly drops in cream or milk even more germs and bacteria are washed off, and as milk is an excellent breeding ground, the common fly is a constant menace."
This week Professor Sweetser lectures at the Chautauqua in Gladstone Park.
