This course is not in deference to the wishes of the congressional delegation, which at a meeting decided that public business, and especially the tariff bill, in which Cushman himself was vitally interested, require their attendance in Washington.

ANOTHER EXCURSION FROM THE EAST TO CRESWELL

This time Did Not Stop in Eugene—Several Pieces of Property Sold

C. N. Fredericks, the wide-awake real estate dealer of Creswell, who is in the city this afternoon, state to a reporter that the A. C. Bohernstedt Company, which owns several thousand acres of land near Creswell which is being set to fruit trees by the company, sold several good tracts of land this week to a party of excursionists which arrived there Monday from the East. Over \$8,000 worth of property was sold to members of the first excursion by the company, and Mr. Fredericks states that he thinks as much was sold to members of the last one.

It is not known whether or not there was any insurance. The origin of the fire is unknown.
