LANE COUNTY CHERRY EXHIBIT GOES TO SALEM

Consists of Thirty-two Boxes of Several Varieties, Expertly Packed

The Lane county exhibit of cherries for the Salem cherry fair was shipped to that city this morning by express and Manager Holt, of the Eugene Fruit Growers' Association, and other cherry enthusiasts are confident that it will win a prize, and have strong hopes of landing the first prize over all the other counties. Last year Lane county was second in the awards, Yamhill being first, but the exhibit from here this time is thought to be much better than the one last year.

The exhibit consists of thirty-two small boxes of the following varieties: Bing, Centennial, Royal Anne, Oxbears and Black Republican. Each box was packed by an expert and all were arranged so that they would stand the shipment well.

Good Market for Cherries
 The association's force of packers was set to work again this morning after a few days' layoff on account of the rain. It was found that there was not a great deal of damage done by the storm, although among the cherries that have been received today there are a number of cracked ones. Great care is exercised in packing to exclude all of those cherries that are in the least damaged.

Shipments are now being made to Los Angeles and Seattle principally, and there is a good market at each of these places. The association is receiving from 80 cents to \$1.50 per box of ten pounds for all that they can ship.

WHO MAKES PRICES IN HAY MARKET?

"We have purchased 700 or 800 tons of hay at \$13," said a representative of Warnock's feed store last night. When asked how it happened that a farmer outside was asking \$16 for his load of loose hay he explained that the farmer wouldn't be able to sell it at any such price. "Ten or twelve dollars is all hay is really worth," he said.

Who sets the price of hay? Is the question that is bothering some Lane county people. Is it the buyer or the seller? Is it what you can get or what you have to pay that makes the price?

Farmers want high prices this year, not only for hay, but for everything, buyers say. As a result men who buy stand as a unit in demanding low figures for their purchases, that is, compared to what is asked them.

And such a state of prices in the world of hay is the reason that "no definite price" is put for the quotation on loose and baled hay in today's market report.
