STATE PRINTER APPOINTS STATE EXPERT

The following letter appeared in yesterday's Portland Journal:

Salem, Or., July 4.—To the Editor of the Journal.—It is funny to note that not a word has been said about the appointment of L. E. Stinson as the state's printing expert. This official is appointed by the governor for the purpose of keeping an eye on the state printer. The different state departments are not all familiar with the laws of measuring, presswork, etc., of the state printing. For that reason an expert printer is appointed to measure all the work done by the state printer. But strange as it may seem, the governor appointed one of Mr. Duniway's most trusted employees. What is the use of wasting this \$5 a day? Why not leave it to the state printer entirely?

READER.

What is the use of kicking about a little thing like that, when the state printer and his machine is the whole thing in Oregon politics? With his net profits of \$30,000 a year he is enabled to dictate appointments, control the legislation and break his ante-election pledges to the people with impunity.

During last winter The Guard called attention to a characteristic job put up by the state printer and certain State University officials to destroy competition among the offices for the printing of that institution. The scheme was to have the state printer demand the work as part of his patronage, but while he collected the bills, the printing to be done in the same local shop that had always been—for some reason known only to themselves—favored by the University business office. The printing of this institution has accordingly been handled in that manner since that time—and the state printer gets his rake-off for doing nothing.

State Printer Duniway carried the Republican primaries on a promise of retrenchment and reform, but has devoted his time of the building up of a machine powerful enough to defeat Representative Bean's flat salary bill, and his pull with the state executive is sufficient to virtually place even the matter of passing upon the work done for the state in his own hands.

The people of Oregon by initiative voted for a flat salary for the state printer's office, but Duniway's influence proved more potent than that of the people when the legislature met. The man whose office nets him \$30,000 a year is always greater than the taxpayers who should be concerned with nothing except that they "dig up" whenever the treasury gets empty.

The people of Coos Bay, in their determination to secure a railroad to the interior, are working along the same lines as are the people of Eugene who want a road to the sea. They have put up money for the survey, which is now proceeding, and will next raise the money to commence actual construction work, which will be carried on until sufficient mileage has been completed to make the road a bonding proposition. This is really the only practical way to build this class of railroads and it will succeed in the Coos Bay instance, as well as here, if the people will only show their faith by subscribing the funds necessary to build and equip fifteen or twenty miles of road.

Just to remind John D. that he isn't forgotten, Mississippi has gone into court to try to drive Standard Oil out of the state and to collect a few fines—aggregating \$11,000,000—for violation of its anti-trust laws.
