LANE COUNTY MAN HAS ROOSEVELTIAN FAMILY

Dr. J. W. Harris, in his monthly report as county health officer, gives out the information that one man reports his nineteenth child during the month of June. He is only 47 years of age and his wife is 42. Of these 19 children 16 are still living. This would certainly please Teddy Roosevelt.

Dr. Harris reports 47 births during the month, 29 being males and 18 females.

There were 22 deaths during the month, 15 males and 7 females. The causes assigned are as follows: Liver disease, 2; accidents, 3; diabetes, 2; no cause assigned, 1; carcinoma of liver, 2; carcinoma of the stomach, 1; tuberculosis, 5; peritonitis, 1; abscess of the brain, 2; drowning, 1; nephritis, 1; failure in circulation, 1; senile debility, 1.

Two cases of contagious disease were reported during the month, one of them being typhoid fever and the other measles.
