WHO HE IS—CAPTAIN PAINE

A Captain by Temperament, His Team Wins Games

You can't tell a ball player by his looks. It is an old and tried maxim. You can't tell one by his parents, his family or by his business will be a maxim of the future. Most people think of bankers as men with lily fingers, and when a good ball player or athlete is found in the banking circle they are surprised, although there are many.

Elmer DeWitt Paine is a banker and a baseball captain. Not only is he captain of the Eugene Colts, but he was captain of the Springfield Blues two years ago, and of perhaps the best University team that ever wore a plate. He is a captain by temperament—that is how he got his position.

Paine never played anywhere but first base. He is tall, with a good reach, and as he grows older constantly improves in his individual weak places. But he is the kind of a ball player that cannot be analyzed. His worth is in his control of a team and in his headwork. That is why the team he captains pulls out of so many games with a lead of only one or two tallies.

He has had much experience. In the Eugene high school he learned much. He entered the University of Oregon in 1904, and played first base there during his whole college lifetime. During the interim between his junior and senior years he was

a member of the Springfield Blues, and helped materially to make the team what it was.

Last year he stayed off the diamond, but when he took to the dust this spring he had not gone back in form. This year his hitting has not been quite among the topnotchers, but his work with the low balls that the first baseman must handle has been better than at any time previous to this.

Most people think he was born in Oregon, but he wasn't. He saw a baseball diamond first in Iowa 23 years ago. His parents are Dr. and Mrs. D. A. Paine, and they belong to the one out of ten that really knows when a strike is a strike.
