DIED

At the home of her daughter, Mrs. Anna V. Lowry, six miles north of Eugene, July 9, 1909, Mrs. Harriet M. Harwood, wife of I. B. Harwood, aged 67 years, from paralysis. Besides her husband she leaves three sons and two daughters. The sons are Frank and Charles E., of Glendale, and George L., who is employed in the Eugene postoffice. The daughters are Mrs. Anna V. Lowry and Miss Gertrude of Salem. The funeral services will be held from the family residence on Sunday at 2 p. m. with interment in the Odd Fellows cemetery.

Irwin Aubrey, who had lived at Gowdyville for the past year, died at his home last Tuesday, aged 69 years. He was born in Chillicothe, Mo., October 12, 1840, and was a soldier in the Civil War, being a member of Company A, 23d Missouri Infantry, and served from 1862 to 1865. He leaves a widow and four children. The funeral was held on Thursday at 10:30 at the I. O. O. F. cemetery. Rev. W. A. Elkins conducting the services, assisted by Rev. Gardner, post commander.—Western Oregon.

Carl Bowen died at the home of his sister, Mrs. J. M. Miller, at Cottage Grove July 9, 1909. Mrs. Scott Christman is also a sister of the deceased. Funeral was held this morning at 10 o'clock at the Masonic cemetery.
