Joseph Simon, Portland's new mayor, is virtually following in the footsteps of his predecessor in keeping the lid on the city's saloons and joints of vice. In this action he is endorsed by the Oregonian, which, however, had never missed an opportunity to abuse Mayor Lane, and sneer at his efforts toward reforming the many things that needed reformation so badly in that city. It is a matter of fact which every honest man must admit that Dr. Lane left Portland in all respects a much better city than he found it, and that his labors have made it a comparatively easy task for Mr. Simon to work still greater reform if he so desires. Lane was opposed at every step by at least two of the daily newspapers, as well as a corrupt and hostile council, while Simon will be commended for everything he does by these same papers and has a council that is in harmony with him from a political standpoint at least. That Portland is a fairly decent city to live in is due largely to Harry Lane, and his successor is forced to accept many of his views relative to municipal government. Sneering at "reformers" has always been a favorite pastime with some newspapers, but just the same this class of persons do a vast amount of good and are responsible for improved civic conditions in many cities and states, and their influence of late years has extended even to national affairs.

Says the Salem Statesman: "Lane county's magnificent display of cherries received the grand prize in the special county exhibit class, and the large silver cup will thus be transferred from old Yamhill, whose display in 1908 was declared the best. To become permanent holder of this cup a county must win it three times, consequently the race up to date is between the two counties mentioned. Be prepared for a really warm contest between them at the cherry fair in 1910."

## THE COBURG UMPIRE

## RAISES SPRINGFIELD'S IRE
