BIGAMIST JOHNSON CONFESSES THAT HE IS THE MYSTERIOUS AND NOTORIOUS JOHN MADSON

San Francisco, July 13.—Christian C. Johnson, sentenced yesterday at San Jose to serve seven years in the penitentiary for bigamy, is reported to have confessed that he is the mysterious "John Madson" wanted here and in many parts of the country for irregular matrimonial ventures. Johnson's alleged confession, however, printed in a local paper, is so full of inconsistencies and so at variance with the statements he has made since his arrest that the police are not inclined to give it full credence.

In his alleged confession Johnson declares he has been married to so many women that he cannot count them off hand.

One of his most amazing feats, according to his own confession, was making love to ten women at one time in Portland, Oregon. While he admits that he got money from most of them, and that his marriages were part of a get-rich-quick scheme, Johnson declared that in every instance he spent the money he received upon the victim herself.

Confirmed in Portland
Portland, July 13.—Investigation shows that Johnson's confession, so far as it bears upon his doings in Portland, lends further evidence to his identity as the mysterious "John Madson." He was known to be active here in 1906 and 1907, and the records of Vancouver, Wash., show a marriage license was issued there on February 16, 1907, to John Madson to marry Mrs. Maria L. Jones. When signing the document he signed "John Madson." He deserted her after obtaining a considerable sum of money. That he attempted to make love to Mrs. DeLude is practically substantiated by the investigation of newspapermen. Mrs. DeLude is an extraordinarily beautiful woman, and lived in a fine residence in one of the best districts. She is supposed to be at Nome, Alaska.

EVELYN THAW AS WITNESS FOR HUSBAND

Slayer of White Wants Release From the Insane Asylum

White Plains, N. Y., July 13.—Evelyn Nesbit Thaw, as a witness in the case of her husband, Harry Thaw,

who is seeking his release from the Matteawan asylum on the claim that he is sane, today testified, after considerable sparring, that on one of her visits to her husband shortly after his incarceration, they had a conversation regarding something that happened just before the shooting of Stanford White. Deputy District Attorney Clark attempted to draw out that during the conversation Thaw had threatened to kill her. She declined to say what had passed between them.

With all of yesterday's testimony in favor of Thaw, and with the indication that his wife, Evelyn Nesbit Thaw, will take the stand in his behalf. Thaw's chances for release appear brighter than at any time since his commitment. District Attorney Jerome is eliminated from the proceedings.

The testimony heard from jailers, inn-keepers, real estate dealers, clerks, a dentist and a reporter, all called by Thaw, was uniformly in his favor.

BRYAN MAKES SUGGESTION TO PRESIDENT TAFT

Want People Given Opportunity to Vote on Election of Senators

Lincoln, Neb., July 13.—W. J. Bryan today addressed a letter to President Taft asking him to allow the people to vote on the popular election of United States senators.

Mr. Bryan says:
"To President Taft:—Now that the states are going to vote on the ratification of an amendment specifically authorizing an income tax, why not give them a chance to vote on an amendment providing for the election of United States senators by popular vote? In your speech of acceptance you said you were personally inclined to favor such a change in the constitution. Would not this be an opportune time to present this subject to congress? Two constitutional amendments, one authorizing an income tax and the other providing for popular election of senators, would make your administration memorable and important, and I pledge you whatever assistance I can render in securing the ratification of these amendments."

GINGLES TRIAL TAKES ANOTHER NEW TURN

Chicago, July 12.—Threats against the life of Assistant State's Attorney Shortz stated that he had received in Gingles since the trial of the pretty lace-maker began, were made today. Shortz stated that he had received a letter in which the writer said:

"If you do not let up on the Gingles trial there will be need of an undertaker in your home."
The prosecution today introduced testimony tending to disprove the story told by Gingles about an alleged attack upon her by Miss Agnes Barrett, her former employer, and the prosecuting witness in the present case.

Edna Wolf, a matron in the La Salle street railway station, was the first witness called. She testified that Ella had told her she had not been assaulted on the night of January 1, when, according to the story she told in court, she was enticed to the Wellington hotel and attacked by Miss Barrett and her friends. Miss Wolf said that Ella also denied that an assault had been made to compel her to become a "white slave."
