COUNTRY DISTRICTS SUBSCRIBE LIBERALLY

Word was telephoned in last evening that the people living between Smithfield and Triangle Lake had subscribed for \$32,000 of stock in the Eugene-Siuslaw railroad and that the canvass was as yet incomplete.

This is encouraging news and ought to stimulate the people of Eugene to renewed effort, as it assures the success of the movement to raise \$150,000 for construction if Eugene will do anywhere near what should be justly expected of our citizens. It ought, moreover, to arouse local pride to the extent of meeting the people of the country districts half way in the matter of a great public enterprise which is necessary to the development of Lane county.

Furthermore, the activity of the people of the Lake Creek district emphasizes the fact that they are determined to have a railroad. If Eugene, which is naturally favored by them, does not want to build it, they will turn their money over to Carver and invite him to come in from Corvallis. They realize that the time has come when they must have railroad connection with the outside world or their country will go backward and land values decrease instead of advancing, as in other localities. This splendid response in two days' time to the appeal for stock subscriptions is indicative of a spirit and determination that cannot be misunderstood or misconstrued.

Let Eugene's answer to the people who naturally look to this city for their commercial inspiration be such that no citizen of the community will be ashamed of the record at any time in the future.

We knew Congressman Hawley would win distinction if given a fair show and plenty of time. Already he has been chosen a member of the Republican baseball nine of the lower house.

WATER COMMITTEE AUTHORIZED TO MAKE CONTRACTS

Street Committee Given Similar Power—Councilmen Don't Come to Meetings

The council last night authorized the fire and water committee and the mayor to make contracts and purchase supplies for the power plant on the McKenzie. The reason for the motion is that the council cannot be gotten together often enough. The action is not without precedent, for several years ago such a plan was followed for city work. The action of the committee will have to be reported to the council, however. Councilman Heller discovered a joker in a similar motion to give power to the street committee to let contracts and buy material. "What you going to do about paying?" he asked. "You don't mean to give them power, I hope?" The council did not, and so the committee will only let street contracts for graveling and do other work.

Odds and Ends

The council allowed the whole amount of Contractor McCrumb's bill for drains on Washington and Eleventh streets.

Fire hose for increase in equipment arrived today.

The council authorized the city attorney to prepare an ordinance to condemn land for a sewer to connect the Fisher laundry. The place is considered a menace to the health of the city.

An ordinance was passed for the grading and graveling of Agate avenue between Eleventh and Twenty-first streets. The paving ordinances were not passed.

An old barn in the alley between Ninth and Tenth and Oak and Pearl streets will be condemned by ordinance.

All bills must be presented to the recorder in the future. The number is too great for the finance committee to investigate thoroughly.

The council adjourned until Monday night. Councilmen Henderson, Gilbert and Williams were absent.

One of the Williams Transfer horses hitched to a light rig ran away while in Fairmount this morning. The rig was left standing in front of Morgan & Stanslie's planing mill when a train came along and frightened the animal, which ran up the street and was caught in the vicinity of M. Svarverud's residence. No damage.

Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Morse leave in the morning for a two weeks' outing at Kitson Springs. Mr. Morse's real estate office will be closed during that time.
