Pardee, Wausau, Wis.; R. H. Dow, New Orleans; R. A. Long, Kansas City. The board of governors chooses the secretary.

GOVERNOR COMES TO MEDFORD'S RESCUE

Medford, Ore., July 15.—Governor Benson, upon petition, today issued an order, the first of its kind in this state, directing Circuit Judge Coke, of Coos county, to try the condemnation suit at Medford. Judge Hanna, of the district in which Medford is situated, refused to hold an extra term of court to try the case, because it would cause a postponement of his summer vacation. The city of Medford alleges that M. E. Hanley, living near Medford, is endeavoring to hold up the city for \$25,000 for a right-of-way for a pipe line for a new water system, construction of which is now delayed until the court decides the matter. The city further sets forth that if the case is not decided at once it will cause a heavy loss in revenue, besides creating a menace to the health of the community.

One of the victims was Professor W. R. Pitkin, head instructor of the commercial department at Albion (Mich.) College. His death was caused by the premature explosion of a revolver on July 5.
