ADVERTISING CITIES

The movement to advertise municipalities has at last been taken up in our chief American city. Most persons would say at the outset that no city in the country is so little in need of advertising as New York. Certainly that city gets more free advertising in different ways than any other within our borders. Yet such a movement has been started by an organization called the New York Industries Association. The object of this organization is to boom merchandise of all kinds sold by New York merchants. Originating in the clothing trades, the movement seems to have spread to other lines. It is a commercial movement now, but may lead eventually to a civic or municipal movement.

The idea that advertising is valuable to a city could receive no better testimonial than this movement undertaken in our greatest commercial centre. When New York feels the need of advertising other cities may well concede its advantages. Possibly we shall yet see the Gotham city government or the dignified Chamber of Commerce outline some plan of publicity to keep the city ahead of all rivals.

The other day the newspapers printed a little item of news which announced that the czar and zarina are about to make a railroad journey for the purpose of participating in some public function and that public notice had been issued to all his subjects that they must not approach within a specified number of miles of the railroad's line on the day when the train is passing. What a contrast is this with what would happen could Taft make this summer the trip across the continent which was contemplated. That journey would witness the crowding of hundreds of thousands of citizens—yes, millions of them—along the railroad right of way, everybody anxious to salute the president and see him or hear him. And for President Taft's part, the more of them who would do this the merrier.

Colorado has a state auditor who has political ambition, or is unusually courageous—he docked the salary of the governor for time he was out of the state, and made it stick.

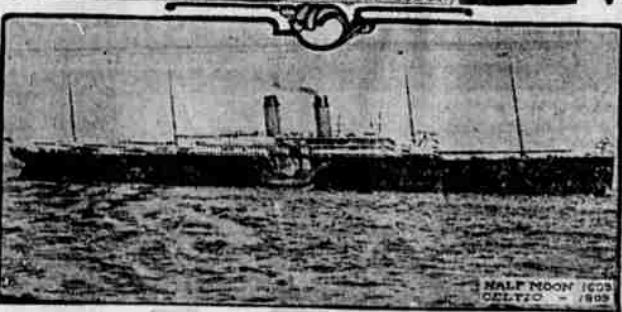
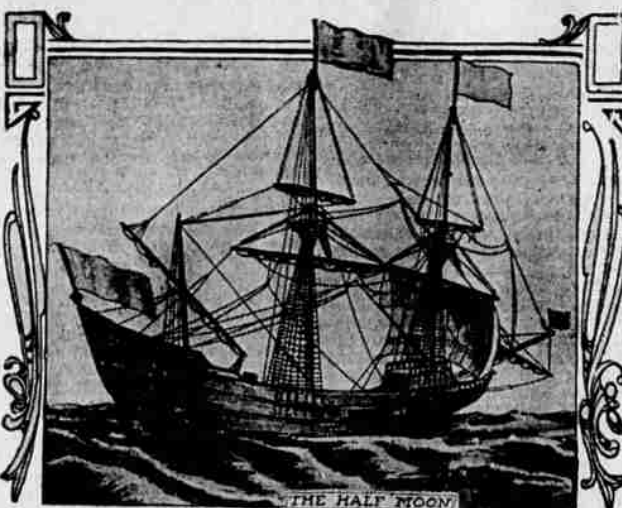
Who said Japs had no business honor? The head of the Japanese sugar trust, which has been through a scandal more or less like the one at home, has quit by the suicide route.

ANCIENT SHIP THAT WILL BE A FEATURE OF HUDSON-FULTON CELEBRATION AT NEW YORK.

ARE RESERVED

President Taft Sets Aside the Great Caves of Josephine County

Portland, July 15.—District forecaster E. T. Allen has just received a telegram stating that the president has signed a proclamation whereby one square mile of land surrounding the entrance to the famous Oregon caves or "Marble Halls of Josephine county" is reserved from any form of disposition and is set aside as a national monument.

These wonderful caves are located within Siskiyou national forest, about 30 miles south of Grants Pass, Or., in Cave mountain, which is one of the peaks of the Grayback range. The mountain rises to an elevation of about 6000 feet and is of limestone formation. The main openings to the caves are at an elevation of about 4000 feet. The entire mountain side for five or six miles shows caverns of various sizes, and it is believed that the interior is honeycombed with caverns like those which have already been explored.

The caves were discovered in 1864 by Eliza Davidson while bear hunting. As far as known they have never been carefully explored. They appear to be made up of a series of galleries rather than roomy caverns, although many beautiful rooms have been discovered. There are thousands of passageways leading in all directions, many of which are partly closed by stalactites. Small streams are found at different elevations, and large bodies of running water can be heard in pits, the bottom of which have not yet been discovered. It is thought this running water accounts for the currents of wind which in some of the galleries blow so hard as to extinguish an open light.

The lime deposits take many beautiful forms: massive pillars, delicate stalactites of alabaster whiteness from the points of which suspend the crystal drop of water carrying its minute deposit of lime from which they are formed, and broad sheets resembling drapery with graceful curves and waves that seem to have been made by varying currents of wind.
