New York, July 17.—The managers of the London music halls have been "stung!" Eva Tanguay, she of the lightning changes and naughty, naughty eye, will not wink at the stage door Johnnies and front row bald heads and sing "I Don't Care," for she did not sail for London yesterday as scheduled. She has cancelled all her English engagements to appear under Florence Zeigfeld's management in "The Follies of 1909." Miss Tanguay says after all she prefers little old New York, so London will not have an opportunity to see her in all her glory. And Eva, in all her glory, as every one knows, is about the most scrumptious sight that the eyes of man may gaze upon, and not go blind. She takes the place of Nora Bayes, who has been the star of the show since it opened a month ago, but who has been suffering recently from a rather severe attack of nervous prostration, which has interfered with her work. In fact, Miss Mayes has not been seen in the company for more than a week, except her appearance last Saturday night, when she sang only one song and found it impossible to continue.

Miss Bayes, it is understood, is anxious to take a long rest. Her withdrawal takes Jack Norworth out of the show, as they were engaged under a joint contract. Miss Bayes received a salary of \$1200 a week, and her husband received \$200 a week. Miss Tanguay will receive more than \$1500 a week—how much more F. Zeigfeld, Jr., manager of the company, would not say last night.

Miss Tanguay's star seems to be in the ascendancy. Mr. Zeigfeld says that if he proves the success he expects, he will have a musical comedy written for her next season.

Low Fields' production of "The Midnight Sons" at the Broadway theatre with Blanche Ring has been popularly classified as the most gigantic musical comedy entertainment that has ever been given inside the four walls of a theatre. Although there is a dash and daring of high life implied in the title of "The Midnight Sons," the character of the entertainment is nevertheless one of absolute purity and offensiveness. The merit of the different songs and dances which are heard and seen in the performance lies in their novelty and in their uniqueness. Blanche Ring, Lotia Faust, Norman Brown, Linden Beckwith, George Monroe, Fritz Williams and other well-known players make up this wonderful cast and contribute to the enormous success of "The Midnight Sons."
