GRADE STAKES BEING SET TOWARD KLAMATH AGENCY

Klamath Falls, July 19.—Indica-
tions are that no time is to be lost by
the Southern Pacific in extending the
California-Northeastern from this
city. Rights-of-way are being secur-
ed between this city and the Klamath
Indian reservation. Engineers are in
the field setting the grade stakes. It
has not been announced that Erick-
son & Peterson have been awarded
the contract for 25 miles from Klamath
Falls, but the numerous trips the
contractors and the construction en-
gineers are making would indicate
that the contract was awarded to
them. Erickson & Peterson have
practically completed all their work
in this city, and it is believed their
entire force will soon be transferred
to the extension. At present they are
doing most of their work on the spur
to the Upper Klamath Lake.

MOVING PICTURES IN TYPHOID FLY WAR

American in England Learning
Other Means to Fight the
Dangerous Insect

London, July 18.—Among the
Americans now on this side of the
pond none has a more important mis-
sion than Henry V. Andrews, who is
securing data and other evidence to
be used in a crusade to banish the
deadly housefly from the American
continent.

Mr. Andrews represents the Mer-
chants' Association pollution commit-
tee, of New York, which is planning
to engage in a national campaign
against the related plagues of water
pollution and flies. The American
people, Mr. Andrews says, are igno-
rant of the deadly nature of the fly
as a disease-scattering insect, and the
committee intends to arouse them to
their peril.

The committee will conduct its war
with moving pictures. Mr. Andrews
will procure films so interesting that
they will appeal by their oddity to the
spectator in a cent arcade and at the
same time preach a good sermon on
the disease-bearing habits of the in-
sect.

Mr. Andrews will inspect European
plants for the disposal of sewage, not-
ably those at Manchester and Ham-
burg, and will concern himself with
the German investigation of the utiliza-
tion of the offensive waste of wood
pulp manufacturers.
