EDUCATE THE CHILDREN

Over 2,500,000 of the 17,000,000 school children enrolled in the United States have, during the school year just closed, been systematically instructed concerning the dangers of consumption and the methods for its cure and prevention, according to a statement recently issued by the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis.

Besides the 2,500,000 children thus regularly instructed in their schools, the National association estimates that fully 1,000,000 more have received instruction at the various tuberculosis exhibits held in all parts of the country or in separate classes and organizations.

A number of investigations conducted in various parts of the world show that a large percentage of the children in the public schools have tuberculosis before they are eighteen. That a larger number of them do not die is due to the fact that healthy children are able to resist the attack of the consumption germ. On account of the prevalence of the disease among children the National association considers their education to be one of prime importance.

In Boston a special commission which recently investigated the subject, found that over 5000 school children in that city alone had positive cases of tuberculosis. In New York, a recent study showed over 25,000 tuberculosis children in the schools. On the basis of these and other investigations, it is estimated by certain authorities that there are nearly 1,000,000 school children in the United States today who will probably die of tuberculosis before they have reached the age of eighteen. This would mean that the public schools of the country are paying annually about \$7,500,000 for the education of children who will die before they reach the age of eighteen. At least one-half of this sickness, and possibly three-fourths of it, could be prevented if the municipal and state governments would adopt better and more hygienic methods of controlling and teaching the children, and if the public in general were alive to the need for tuberculosis prevention.

The National association declares that the best way to wipe out consumption among the children is to educate both them and their parents so that they will know that tuberculosis is a communicable disease, that it can be cured, and that it must be prevented.

There should be no trouble in completing the amount of stock necessary to justify actual construction work upon the Eugene-Siuslaw railroad. This railroad is needed to make permanent Eugene's splendid growth of the past three years, and will guarantee still further advancement along all lines. Within thirty days actual construction upon this railroad to the sea should be under way.

**FOURTH REG'T
MAY DISBAND IN
NEXT FEW MONTHS**

Radical Changes Must Be Made
in O. N. G., According
to New Law

Portland, July 21.—How to comply with the act of congress of January 21, 1902, requiring that all National Guard organizations shall be completed before January 21, 1910, is giving the general staff of the Oregon National Guard no little concern. The Fourth Regiment, O. N. G., as now organized, consists of two battalions of four companies each, and under the law to go into effect next January one of both of these battalions must be disbanded or transferred into the Coast Artillery reserve companies. It is possible to disband or transfer one of these battalions, and maintain the other as a separate battalion, since the law governing the regular army recognizes a separate battalion as a completed organization and not as a part of a regiment. But two battalions designated as a regiment is considered by the secretary of war to be an incomplete organization, and therefore will not be allowed to remain a part of the National Guard after January 21, 1910.

The policy of the war department is to increase the coast artillery reserve by transferring a portion of the National Guard infantry of the three Pacific states to the artillery branch of the service or by organizing new artillery companies in those states. So to meet the requirement of the war department and at the same time comply with the statute of January 21, 1902, it is altogether probable that Adjutant-General Finzer will effect a transfer of at least one battalion of the Fourth regiment to the artillery branch of the service within the next six months.

The Fourth Regiment is composed of eight companies located at the following stations: Ashland, Roseburg, Cottage Grove, Albany, Dallas, McMinnville, and two companies at Eugene, with regimental headquarters at Eugene.

It will not be the policy of General Finzer to arbitrarily require an infantry company to transfer to the artillery service. The wishes of the infantrymen will be consulted in the matter, although it may be necessary to muster out of the service companies that decline to enter the artillery.

Radical action providing for an increase in the artillery branch of the Washington National Guard has been taken by the adjutant general of that state, who has just issued an order requiring all of the infantry organizations west of the Cascade mountains to transfer into artillery companies in order to comply with the demands of the war department for the increase in the Coast Artillery reserves.

It is not believed that such a sweeping change will be made in the National Guard of Oregon as has been ordered by the adjutant-general of Washington, but it is practically certain that the next few months will witness the breaking up of the Fourth Infantry and the organization of either four or eight new companies for the Coast Artillery reserve.
