MILL AT BLUE BIRD

Rich Mining Property in Blue River District Will Soon Be a Producer

GEORGE BERTOFF PASSES
WORTHLESS CHECKS ON
FRIENDS, THEN LEAVES

Now a Warrant Is Out for His Arrest—Secures \$20 Fraudulently.

George Bertoff, formerly employed by the Kushon Comfort Shoe Co., but later working in one of McCormick's cigar stores, is wanted by the local officers for obtaining money under false pretenses, being accused of passing two worthless checks, each for \$10.

Bertoff presented a \$10 check at one of the McCormick stores Thursday afternoon after banking hours, stating that he needed the money and could not wait until the banks opened the next day. He said he had an account in the First National Bank, and the check was signed by himself, made payable to the firm. The same evening the performance was repeated at Nadeau's cigar store. Yesterday when the checks were presented at the bank for payment it was found that Bertoff had no funds there. A search was made for him, but it was found that he had left the city. He told some of his friends that he was going to Seattle, and others that Spokane was his destination. The officers in the two cities will be notified to look out for the man.
