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THEY WORK WHILE YOU SLEEP

TWO DEAD AND FIFTEEN INJURED IN TRAIN WRECK

Kansas City, July 25.—At least two are known to be dead, fifteen missing and between twenty-five and thirty injured in the wreck of the Wabash passenger train thirty miles east of here tonight. The train fell into the Missouri river where the track was weakened by a landslide. The dead: Engineer Phillip Flowers. Fireman D. Bond. The engine, baggage car and smoker and a dead-head sleeper plunged into the water and were completely submerged. Many of the injured passengers are seriously hurt. In the darkness and confusion it is not known whether the missing passengers are in the submerged coaches or whether they escaped to dry land. As many passengers were riding in the smoker, which is entirely under water, it is feared that at least some of the missing persons are dead. The injured were brought to this city on a freight train.

OBITUARY

Josiah Brewster was born August 10, 1827, near McConnellsville, Morgan county, Ohio. He was united in marriage to Miss Elizabeth Lawrence in 1850. To this union were born seven children, only two of whom, Oscar L. of Tillamook Lake, and Miss Luella, of Eugene, together with his wife, survive him. Mr. Brewster enlisted in Company E, 148th Regiment Ohio National Guards, and served throughout the civil war as sergeant, being mustered out at the close of the war. He was an active member in J. W. Geary post, taking an active part in all the affairs of the Grand Army. At the close of the war he returned to Ohio, where he lived until 1886, when he removed to Oregon, and had lived in or near Eugene ever since. Mr. Brewster's health failed about 1907, and since that time he has been an invalid most of the time. He was a member of the United Brethren church while in Ohio, but on coming to Oregon united with the Cumberland Presbyterian church, and at the time of the reunion he became a member of the Central Presbyterian church, of which he remained a faithful member to the end. His death occurred July 24, 1909, at the age of 81 years, 10 months and 24 days.

COLEMAN PUTS WOODEN LADDERS ON BUILDING FOR FIRE ESCAPES

Some time ago J. B. Coleman, owner of the three-story building on Willamette street, known as the Coleman lodging house, was ordered by the city council to place fire escapes on the building, owing to the combustible material with which it is built and the consequent danger to the occupants of the lodging house from fire. The council did not designate the kind of escapes to be put up, and as there has been no standard set, Coleman used his own judgment as to the best kind of escapes and put up four ordinary wooden ladders, two leading from the second floor to the second floor and two from the second floor to the sidewalk in the rear of the building. This may result in a fire escape ordinance being passed designating the kind of fire escapes to be placed on the buildings. Be it said to Coleman's credit, however, that he painted the ladders green and they look better than the ordinary carpenter's ladder.

READ DIME NOVELS AND HAD A GUN

Albany, Or., July 25.—Lem Goodman, alleged to be a Pinkerton detective, was arrested here last night for carrying concealed weapons and was today fined \$10 and costs in the justice court. He had been here about 10 days and had confidentially disclosed to a considerable number in town that he was a Pinkerton detective of some note, and the thrilling stories of his adventures in pursuit of criminals made him a hero of some of the more credulous youths. On these occasions he let it be known that he always carried a small arsenal with him. John Catlin, of the city police force, doubted the truth of his representations, and informed him of the Pinkertons, who informed him the alleged detective was an impostor. When arrested he was armed with a heavy revolver. He spent much of his time reading dime novels and smoking cigarettes, and it is thought he had become mentally unbalanced.
