A Pitcher's Battle Which Was Heaped With Errors

Eugene won yesterday on Cottage Grove's eight big glaring errors, helped along by several mistakes of judgment. The score was 12 to 7. While the critical game may be discounted, the game was full of interest, for it was to the real fast contest what an amusing clown is to the finished acrobat, not good, but amusing.

The interest long before the first inning centered around the pitchers. Would Eugene be able to hit young Baker, the Chicago ladies' man? and what will Bond be like?

So far as pitching goes honors were about even. Bond had the best variety of curves and was in the best form, but Baker had the most speed, and showed that he knew the most baseball. Bond dished up in the pinches a very fine variety of shots that kept the batters guessing. The hits which were made off of him were found in the periods when the opponents did not look dangerous. Their seven runs were partly due to mistakes of the team back of him, rather than to his pitching.

Baker had one bad inning, the fifth, but all was due to his support, for they threw the ball around the diamond as though it were an air-

ship. After that he steadied down and not a hit was made off his delivery.
