TIN CANS FOR RESTAURANTS AND HOTELS

Garbage Can Ordinance to Pro-
 tect Health of the City
 Passed Last Night

The fire limits were ex-
 tended last night and now are
 as follows:

From 160 feet east of the
 corner of Seventh and Wil-
 lamette streets to alley and
 east 160 feet to Seventh
 street and west to the place
 of beginning; and beginning
 160 feet east of Seventh and
 Willamette streets, south to
 Park street, thence east to
 the alley running north and
 south between Oak and Pearl
 streets, thence north to Sev-
 enth street and west to the
 place of beginning.

The vote on the fire ordi-
 nance was: Ayes—Garrett,
 Berger, Roach, Mayor Mat-
 lock; noes—Gilbert, Heller,
 Henderson.

The council passed the tin can or-
 dinance last night, providing that hot-
 els, restaurants and similar places
 shall have cans with tops for gar-
 bage. Councilman Gilbert suggested
 that the plan be extended to the
 whole city.

Garbage problems were also touch-
 ed upon. A plan to divide the city
 into four sections, with a garbage
 man to each, will probably be con-
 sidered. The right for each section
 will probably be sold to the highest
 bidder. The rates will of course be
 regulated by the city.

Odds and Ends
 A resolution was passed last night
 at the council meeting stating what
 plans were meant when the council
 passed a resolution declaring its in-
 tention to build a power plant on the
 McKenzie. This action was taken in
 order to avoid legal complications in
 the Millican case on August 9.

Condemnation of land on South Wil-
 lamette street was referred to a com-
 mittee to consider.
 The width of Agate avenue beyond
 Twenty-first street took 30 minutes
 of the council's time. The question
 involved was should it be 80 feet
 wide or 66 feet. The matter was laid
 over.

Assessments were ordered last
 night for the payment of the paving
 of Oak street, between Ninth and
 Eleventh.

A sewer was ordered constructed
 last night from south side of Third
 street, from the west side of Lincoln
 street to Lawrence street.

The council adjourned to meet on
 Monday night.

MOUNTAIN ROAD TRAVEL IS ON IN FULL BLAST

Number of Visitors Will Prob-
 ably Exceed Those of
 Last Year

Travel up the McKenzie and Wil-
 lamette has begun in earnest. De-
 spite the poor roads the number of
 visitors will probably exceed the re-
 cord of last year, when over 1000 went
 over the highways to the various re-
 sorts.

Automobiles can go to Belknap
 Springs, but beyond Walterville the
 road is too rough for any satisfac-
 tion. The Willamette old Military
 road is said to be excellent for au-
 tomobiles, compared to other mountain
 roads, until Hazel Dell is reached.
 From there on deep ruts make it im-
 possible for machines to go through
 to Eastern Oregon.

A Springfield man estimates that a
 few hundred dollars would repair the
 road so that machines could go to
 Klamath Falls. Beyond the summit
 the route is easy for automobiles in
 almost any direction.

MINERS NEEDED IN LANE COUNTY TO DEVELOP RESOURCES

F. J. Hard and Herbert Leigh
 Think People Need Edu-
 cation About Mining

"We need miners, men who will
 develop veins, not hold and wait for
 gold to grow," said F. J. Hard this
 morning in speaking of the mining
 interests of Lane county.

"Ought not Lane county to have a
 smelter?" was asked the director of
 the Vesuvius mine in the Bohemia
 district.

"Don't worry about that," he said.
 "Just open up the veins and the smel-
 ter will come."

"People offer a man twenty per-
 cent interest on a proposition in three
 months and they bite, but if you put
 up a two or three-year proposition
 for half the percentage, or a little
 less, they will sniff at you."

Mr. Hard has about fifteen men
 working in the Vesuvius mine develop-
 ing its ledges. The mine is most
 thoroughly developed, and has the
 faith of its manager.

Other mining men also take the
 same view. Herbert Leigh, the en-
 gineer, said the other day that Lane
 county people need educating if they
 are going to develop their mineral re-
 sources. Both Leigh and Hard have
 confidence in Lane county deposits.
