Stuart, said to have been married to James Hazen Hyde when the latter was a member of the Life Assurance Society of New York, a short distance from his cabin near Mukilteo, in the body and head. Washington, July 28.—Congressional visitors reported that President Taft is not satisfied with the prospect of the proposed agreement of the senate and house tariff conferees, as announced last night. Taft is said to have expressed himself in emphatic terms regarding lumber, and to have declared he would insist that the rate on lumber should not go over \$1.25.

RAILROAD MASS MEETING TONIGHT AT CLUB ROOMS

Siuslaw Proposition Will Be Presented to Small and Large Investor Alike

A popular meeting will be held tonight at the Commercial Club to discuss ways and means of getting added support for the Siuslaw railroad. Men who can help but a little are asked to attend, for the project is now so developed that the little sums of stock are those that will count. Good speakers will tell of the details of the project, and explain the methods. The engineers are now making preliminary surveys of the route, and judging from public expression no physical difficulties are in the way of construction.

LUMBER SCHEDULE CAUSE OF GREATEST DISSENSION IN CONGRESS OVER TARIFF BILL

Washington, July 28.—That hides have been traded for lumber, in preparation of the report on the tariff bill, is reiterated about the capitol today in connection with the report that the tariff conferees had agreed to the retention of the senate rate of \$1.50 per thousand on rough lumber. Senators Nelson and Clapp and Representatives Tawney and other senators and representatives are quite incensed over the change that has been made and many assertions are heard that no report for a higher rate on lumber than the house had fixed could be adopted by the house. The low lumber men in the senate generally have been among the insurgents, who had voted against the bill originally, and these were hopeless of preventing the adoption of the conference report in that body. This state of mind was largely due to the fact that they did not believe the hide men would stand with them in opposition to the report.

Counting nine insurgents who would vote against the conference report on general principles, and whose opposition has been intensified by a decision in favor of higher lumber, the hide men said they would have eighteen Republican votes against the conference report if it favored free hides. The "insurgents," failing to count upon the free hide opponents, say their only hope is in the house, and the low lumber men there profess themselves willing to accept the responsibility of defeating the bill if the \$1.50 rate on lumber stands. They do not, however, believe it will stand.

MARTIAL LAW PROCLAIMED BY KING ALFONSO

Barcelona Almost At the Mercy of a Mob Led by Anarchists

Madrid, July 28.—King Alfonso today issued a decree proclaiming martial law and the suspension of constitutional guarantees throughout Spain.

Madrid, July 28.—The latest official reports from Barcelona indicate that the city is almost at the mercy of the mob. Two notorious anarchists are reported to be leading in the rioting, which is accompanied by incendiarism and the destruction of property. The convent of Mercedas was taken by assault and the church of St. Paul and the congregational schools of St. Antonio were burned. Bands of the strikers have been dispatched to the surrounding country to destroy the railroad approaches to Barcelona, in order to prevent the arrival of troops.

Troops Are Arriving
Barcelona, July 27.—Troops are arriving to reinforce the garrison here. No newspapers were published today, and the "House of the People," the headquarters for the rioters, has been closed by the military authorities.

Cabinet Will Resign
Hendaye, France, July 28.—King Alfonso today hurriedly left San Sebastian for Madrid. It is rumored the ministry will resign in favor of a military cabinet, as the movement at Barcelona is regarded as clearly revolutionary.

Camps Bombed
Melilla, July 28.—Spanish batteries today are ceaselessly bombarding the camps of the Kabyle tribesmen at the foot of Mount Guruga. Facilities for treating the wounded here are utterly inadequate.
