PICTURESQUE MEMBERS OF THE SIBERIAN VILLAGE, ALASKA-YUKON-PACIFIC EXPOSITION, AT SEATTLE.

A party of thirty-four natives of northeastern Siberia will be a feature of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition, and, although living within 150 miles of each other, each tribe speaks a different dialect. No Siberian Eskimos have ever been exhibited at a world's fair before. The community lives in a long, narrow village, with the Siberians. If one gets a dozen sealskins or half a dozen deer caribou and has a full box of goods, the food supply of one family runs out, the others contribute, with no thought of remuneration. If a hunter strays away from his tribe, he is privileged to draw upon the food supply of each other tribe. Old and useless members of the family are killed.
