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THE "SEATTLE SPIRIT" AND THE "EUGENE WAY"

"Cities are built where fate makes them," said the mayor of Seattle a few days ago in welcoming the newspapermen of the country. There is much truth in his statement and Seattle is a living illustration of his theory—the theory that where a city is needed a city there will be.

The rapid advancement of Seattle has been one of the miracles of the West. A few years ago there was nothing but stump-covered hills where Seattle stands. But with the westward course of empire new cities were needed and fate ordained that they should rise on the shore of Elliot Bay. So Seattle was founded, and while still a "new town," it has become one of the most bustling cities of the world.

There is a city needed where Eugene is located—a great inland jobbing and manufacturing city. It is situated at the head of the Willamette valley, where the natural passes lead across the mountains to the rapidly developing empire of Eastern Oregon, and westward down the Siuslaw to the rich coast territory. A vast area, rich in timber, mineral, agricultural and fruit products immediately around it between the two mountain ranges. It offers every inducement to the homebuilder in natural scenery, climate and educational facilities.

No other city in Oregon possesses the advantages of Eugene, and perseverance in the "Seattle Spirit," which down here we call the "Eugene Way," is sure to make it a business centre equal to, if not more important than such inland cities as Spokane and Denver. In only three years the country town of 6000 has grown into a live city of 12,000, and the real development of the country, reflected in the building of power plants, electric roads and irrigation works, has just begun. The Oregon Eastern, placing the trade of Eastern Oregon at our doors, will be under actual construction this fall, and the Eugene & Siuslaw will connect with us with tidewater in the other direction before another year passes if the people give the enterprise the encouragement it deserves.

The Greater Eugene that seemed so far in the future three years ago is almost at hand. Another three years should give us a population of 25,000.

The way to build the Eugene & Siuslaw railroad is to begin actual construction, not of the first section, but of the entire road to Florence, whenever the stock subscriptions reach \$50,000. Survey and locate the road to the coast, secure the rights of way, and begin throwing up the grade on this end. Then we will be ready to do business with the bond-buyers, who are looking for safe investments in securities. That was the way most of the great railroads of the Middle West were built—and it is the only way we can successfully proceed here. The Siuslaw, the Coos Bay and many other railroads have been agitated in Oregon for thirty or forty years without a mile of track being laid. Talk never constructed railway lines, but money and the courage to invest will succeed every time. We are going to build the Siuslaw railroad this time.

ENGLISH NOBLEMEN MENTIONED FOR SERVIAN THRONE.
