NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS AND PROPERTY OWNERS

Notice is hereby given that pursuant to the terms of Ordinance No. 901, passed by the Common Council July 21st, 1909, for the improvement of Tenth street, from Willamette street to Pearl street, and Ordinance No. 902, passed by the Common Council July 21, 1909, for the improvement of Oak street, from Sixth to Seventh streets, bids will be received by the street committee of the council at the office of the city recorder of the city of Eugene until August 6, 1909, at 5 o'clock p. m., for the improvement of said streets by the construction of cement curbing along both sides of said streets, and by paving the said streets between said points with bitulithic, asphalt or other hard surface pavement in accordance with the plans and specifications therefor now on file in the office of the city recorder.

Bidders are required to state the price in detail in accordance with the specifications, and on the form prepared by the city engineer.

Separate contracts will be awarded for the lowest bidder for the curbing, paving and drainage and the said improvement shall be completed within 90 days from the date of letting the contract therefor.

The work to be done under the supervision of the street committee and to be approved by them. An approved bond will be required of each contractor for the faithful performance of the contract. A certified check in a sum equal to five per cent of the amount bid, payable to J. D. Matlock, mayor, is required to accompany each bid. The street committee reserves the right to reject any and all bids.

EUGENE IS THE DUMP GROUND FOR TOWNS

Roseburg Is the Worst Adherent of the "Pass 'Em Along" System

Eugene is the dumping ground for Western towns' paupers, insane and penniless criminals. For two or three years observers have noticed that such towns as Albany and Roseburg prefer to send their unfortunates, the insane and criminals, to Eugene than to bear the expense of keeping them in the county poorhouse, or of sending them to the proper state institutions. At Roseburg this practice is adhered to by both county and city officials. There the officers prefer to send them to Eugene rather than south, for the railroad fare is less. In speaking of an insane man the Roseburg Review says:

Judge Wonacott, after an examination of Morrissey, in this city last Saturday, bought him a ticket to Eugene and put him aboard the train. In the evening of that day a man was taken off the train at Eugene and later committed to the asylum. Newspaper dispatches say he gave the name of J. Bope, but from published descriptions of him and circumstances generally, Judge Wonacott believes this is the same man who gave his name as Morrissey here. At Eugene the man demanded admission to residences, saying he was urged to do this by unknown voices.

PORTLAND MARKETS

Portland, July 29.—Oregon's hop yield this year will amount to about 80,000 bales, according to A. J. Ray, a well-known grower and dealer, who has been investigating the results of the late rains. Before the showers of the past week the yield was figured at between 60,000 and 70,000 bales, but the warm showers have given the vines new life and added at least 10,000 bales to the total.

"Last year's Oregon output of hops amounted to 90,000 bales," said Mr. Ray, "and the heaviest yield of hops was in 1906, when the total reached 140,000. This year's total would be a great deal larger than it is were it not for the fact that a great many yards were neglected on account of the low prices."

He thinks the advance in the value of the hops will do little good to the growers, as about two-thirds of the farmers raising hops have contracted to sell at 10 cents and thereabouts, and so the profit will go into the pockets of the dealers instead of to the men who bore the brunt of the low prices last year.

Mixed Values in Butter
Punishment galore is being issued out to various creamery men by others of the craft who are thereby punishing themselves. The market price for creamery butter is badly mixed, all sorts of values being quoted by the makers. Some of them are still maintaining the market at 29c, others are asking 30c, others 30 1/2c, and still another 31c a pound. Those holding back at 29c are making an effort to punish those who put the market to 30 1-2c. Some claim that the latter are bringing in Eastern butter and are boosting the local price merely to allow them to sell their outside product at a more favorable price but the 30 1-2c men say that the advance to that price was fully justified because of the shorter supply and the better demand. Then, again the 31c men state that theirs is the only real market, so today you can buy butter at your own price. Conditions are likely to adjust themselves during the coming forty-eight hours.

Some Quoting Cheese at 17c
More firmness is shown in the cheese market at this time. The situation is daily improving and some of the wholesale growers advanced their quotations to 17c for flats this morning, but along Front street prices are generally unchanged at 16 1-2c.

Fruits
Raspberries are higher by at least 10 cents a crate is the local market. Some are being made at 20c above those formerly quoted. Receipts were better this morning, but the quality was good.

Loganberries are showing mixed quality, some very leaky stuff coming forward. Sales are being made today at \$2@2.25 a crate.

Blackberries are slightly lower with receipts somewhat better.

Wheat Steady
Although the market was weak, local wheat prices were not quoted lower yesterday, but business was not extensive. Some of the larger buyers are out of the market entirely, now, and the others are operating on a rather cautious scale.

Eggs Drop
There is considerable difference of opinion among handlers of eggs as to the right market price. Some interests assert their ability to secure 28c quite easily for supplies, while others are offering all they have at 27 1-2c. Receipts are better than expected, and as some supplies are being brought out from the East the situation is not nearly so good as a week ago.

Good Demand for Livestock
Good demand and light arrivals characterize the condition of the Portland livestock market today, and hogs are particularly needed. Prices of live hogs cannot advance any further, in the language of one commission house, "unless they go through the roof."

Several hundred sheep from Willamette valley points are among the receipts today. The animals were gathered in small lots from the various farms, and no big flocks were secured in any one locality. Sheep are now in good condition in the valley on account of the abundance of grass.
