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Eugene should complete the Siuslaw railroad stock subscription to the \$50,000 mark within the next week. Then active construction work will be commenced, and as it progresses the people along the line, the farmers and timber land owners, the sawmill men and dairymen, who will be vastly benefitted, will contribute liberally to keep the work going until outside capital is procured. Once grading is begun on this road bed The Guard predicts that there will be no cessation of operations until the cars are running between Eugene and navigable water. What we need at this time, and that quickly, is assurance of enough money to make a good start on construction.

Next month, during the sessions of the National Irrigation congress at Spokane, a fifteen-acre tract of land near by will be devoted to the various methods of irrigation. It is understood that there are fourteen different kinds of approved irrigation, each one adapted to varying conditions of soil and climate, and all of them will be demonstrated. Economical methods, scientific and approved by experience, will be shown. Such displays are extremely valuable, and knowledge derived from such sources is worth acquiring.

The Corvallis & Alsea railroad has already made a proposition to the Lake Creek people to extend its line into that section of the country. If Eugene does not want the coast trade diverted to Corvallis the people here should delay no longer in subscribing to the stock of the company which purposes to build from this city to the Siuslaw.
