NINE WERE KILLED IN TROLLEY WRECK Over Forty Are Injured, Many of Them Beyond Recovery

Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, Aug. 2.—Nine killed outright and over 40 wounded, several probably fatally, is the result of a head end collision of two passenger trains on the Coeur d'Alene & Spokane Electric railway, close to the town of LaCrosse, a small station two miles west of Coeur d'Alene. The collision occurred at 4:10 Sunday afternoon. Both trains were loaded to the guards with passengers, most of whom were going and coming from the registration for Coeur d'Alene Indian lands, which has been in progress here for the past sixteen days. All of the killed and injured were in the first car of the west-bound train. This car was literally shivered into splinters by the force of the impact. Some of the dead were so terribly mutilated as to be unrecognizable.

When the news of the accident reached here, every possible means of conveyance was fastened to the scene and the injured were rapidly removed to the undertaking rooms and the local hospital. These places were soon besieged by anxious inquirers who feared for the fate of relatives. Most of the dead and injured were strangers and the process of identification is slow. They were evidently people who had come here to register for land and were returning to their homes when the accident occurred.

The responsibility for the wreck has not been placed. It is reported, however, that the train going to Spokane, which consisted of three cars, had instructions to take the switch at LaCrosse and give the main track to the train from Spokane, which consisted of four cars. This is known as the campers' limited, and makes the run between here and Spokane in 57 minutes. Apparently, it is stated, the motor driver of the lighter train misunderstood his orders or neglected to follow them, and kept the main track at full speed.

RINGLING CIRCUS GOES TO ROSEBURG Businessmen Offer Big Inducements in Order to Get the Big Show

Final arrangements for the exhibition of Ringling Bros.' circus in this city on the 27th of next month were made today, when a number of local hotel and restaurant men and merchants banded themselves in an agreement to pay the city license fee of \$25. The advance agent of the circus, who is in the city, asserted that the advertising Roseburg would receive through the stop of the show—one of the biggest in the world—entitled them to a remittance of the city license, and declared if this was not done the show would not stop here. Many businessmen of the city signed a petition addressed to the city council, asking for remittance of the license, but before this could be presented to Mayor Hoover the amount was pledged as before stated. The agent contracted for about 15 acres of ground in North Roseburg from Al Creason as a site for the circus, at the very reasonable figure of \$10. The advertising car will arrive here one week from today. The circus will draw thousands of visitors to Roseburg, affording such people a chance to see the street improvement work.—Review.

(It is understood that Ringlings will not show in Eugene as usual, since making arrangements to pitch their tents in Roseburg.)

MR. FORTIER MAKES CORRECTION OF REPORT

Editor Daily Guard:—In your issue of July 31st, in which the proceedings of the irrigation meeting in Eugene are reported, I notice I am quoted as having made the statement that "In Lane county are found natural reservoir sites and the water supply should not cost more than \$25 per acre." I am misquoted on this point and will appreciate it if your paper will note this error in your next issue.

In discussing the probable cost of water in Lane county I wished to emphasize the fact that the problem involved here was a simple one and that the cost would be very much less than in some sections referred to by a previous speaker in which it was stated the cost had been as much as \$100 per acre. The statement I made that was misquoted was on this point, and was that owing to the favorable conditions existing in Lane county "It should cost nothing like \$75 or \$100 per acre to provide irrigation and that the cost in all probability would come considerably under half these amounts."
