GOPHERS AND MOLES CONTINUAL EXPENSE TO SOUTHERN PACIFIC

Burrow Under Portions of the
Track and Cause Mushy
Spots in Roadbed

Little gophers and moles are the cause of endless trouble for the Southern Pacific Company, and continual expense, especially in the Willamette Valley where the land is rich and the gophers and moles like to live and dig. Foreman Strawn is raising portions of the track near Eugene an inch to two inches, and other section foremen have to do the same in other sections.

The gophers burrow under the track, carrying the dirt out to the right-of-way and neighboring property. Thus undermined, the track gradually sinks. Not only will this summer, but next fall when the rains come the tracks will sink with water and cause the mud-spots on the roadbed.

Foreman Strawn is now handling a crew of Italians on his section. He had one of Greeks but they quit or were fired. While he has the privilege of employing white labor, which he likes the best, he is unable to get them for section work. The Italians receive \$1.20 a day.

In describing the life they live the foreman says that they eat very little compared to white men. Five loaves of bread yesterday provided the whole dinner for the crew of eight. Bread seems to be their chief food. Many of the laborers are rather ambitious, owning property in various parts of the country. This crew has just completed pulling out seven miles of weeds on the grade of the track. The grass can be burned but the weeds among the stones will not burn.

\$400,000 DEAL IN TIMBER LAND

South Bend, Wash., Aug. 4.—The Pacific Empire Lumber Company has sold its holdings in Pacific county to the Weyerhaeuser Timber Company, consideration \$400,000. The deal involves 5,000 acres of timber land and a fine mill site in the heart of South Bend. The principal stockholders in the Pacific Company are also stockholders in the Weyerhaeuser or Timber Company. The selling company was the second largest land owner in Pacific county.

MUNICIPAL POWER PLANT TO SOLVE THE EUGENE WATER PROBLEM

Council Favors Meter Measure,
But City Needs Extensions
More Than Meters

That the water service will be much better when the city owns its own electric power plant is the stated belief of Councilmen A. W. Gilbert and T. H. Garrett. Under the expense and difficulties of operating the water systems the service is very good indeed, although a few users have made complaints.

The councilmen believe that the meter system is the fairest measure of water, and that under that plan the customer could use water at any time. They also think that the plan of measuring the towns by the number of square yards is unfair, but under the conditions that meters alone will solve the problem.

For the present, however, the city is not in financial condition to install meters, but as soon as it is able to do so, they will undoubtedly be installed. The councilmen believe that extensions of the water system are of more importance than meters until the town is fully covered.

A heavy drain on the municipal plant has been the charge for pump No. 2. As soon as the city power plant is running, the cost will be much less. The Willamette Valley Company's bill takes at least a third of the income every month. For this reason rates have not been lowered.

COTTAGE GROVE SHORT OF WATER

At the meeting of the Cottage Grove city council last night the hours for irrigation were fixed at 6:30 to 7:30 in the evening, and the sprinkling of streets prohibited. If anyone is caught using city water for irrigation purposes before or after the hours named, they will be promptly arrested and fined the limit. Just at this time water is scarce, and it is claimed people use no judgment about its use. Last night the electric light management kept a man at the plant for the sole purpose of pulling the fire from the grates in case the supply of water failed. Luckily this did not happen. The waste of water is a very important matter, and the hours for irrigation should be carefully observed.—Western Oregon.

A certified check in a sum equal to five per cent of the amount bid, payable to J. D. Matlock, mayor, is required to accompany each bid. The street committee reserves the right to reject any and all bids.
