ALBANY MAN FINED \$50
FOR KILLING DEER
BEFORE OPEN SEASON

Mark Bussard Pleads Guilty
 and Is Assessed \$50 by Jus-
 tice of the Peace Bryson

Mark Bussard, of Albany, pleaded
 guilty in the Eugene justice court
 this morning to the charge of kill-
 ing deer out of season and Judge
 Bryson imposed a fine of \$50 upon
 him.

Bussard, in company with a num-
 ber of other Albany men, was at
 Heiknap Springs during the latter
 part of July on an outing. It was
 learned by other campers there
 that Bussard had killed a buck deer
 on the 29th or 30th of that month,
 only two or three days before the
 open season began. The local offi-
 cers were informed of the matter
 and a warrant was issued for Bus-
 sard's arrest. Constable Plank lo-
 cated him in Albany yesterday and
 the officers there placed him under
 arrest. He came to Eugene last
 night and pleaded guilty this morn-
 ing.
