ALBANY HAS
BAD \$65,000
CONFLAGRATION

The First National Bank building
was gutted early this morning in one
of the worst fires in the history of
the city, entailing a loss of about
\$65,000, says yesterday's Albany
Democrat.

Just after 1 o'clock an employee at
Spire's stables discovered fire issu-
ing from the tailor shop in the rear
of the L. E. Blain Clothing Co., and
gave the alarm, with a quick re-
sponse from our volunteer firemen,
who soon had streams on from the
hydrants. The engines were slow
but did good work when started.
The flames spread fiercely, and it
was impossible to confine them to
the lower part. They worked their
way through into the second floor
and into the garret under the roof,
where it was impossible to reach
them, and they soon covered the
upper part of the building, com-
pletely gutting it, but leaving the
floor of the second story before fi-
nally gotten under control with eight
or nine streams from the rear, side
and front. Not until after six o'clock
was the last spark out. By
this time the building was complet-
ely drenched with water and every-
thing in it soaked.

The L. E. Blain Clothing Co., is
the heaviest loser, carrying a stock
of \$34,000 completely ruined, ex-
cept a few things gotten out from the
front, with an insurance of \$20,000.
The wall of the building is unim-
paired, but the damage must be
close to \$15,000, with an insurance
of \$12,000.

All the valuables of the First
National Bank were in the vault, in-
cluding all the papers. The vault
was hardly heated, so well were the
flames kept from that part of the
building.

The second story, occupied by law
offices, is a complete ruin. Hewitt
& Son got most of their things out,
and \$500 will cover their loss, and
the same is the case of the office of
P. R. Kelly, with a loss of about
\$200. L. J. Swan's office, being in
the rear, suffered severely, a new
typewriter going. In the library
were some of the books of Judge
Wolverton's library. The loss is
about \$1,000. G. W. Wright got
out part of his Oregon reports. His
loss is about \$1,000. J. C. Christy
had a large library costing \$4,000,
and he got out only a dictionary and
a code. He was the only one in the
second story insured, carrying \$1,
000. Receipts taken out. Judge
Duncan's Oregon reports were in
Mr. Christy's office and were burned.
W. S. Ribley saved nothing, and
loses about \$300 worth of property.
W. D. Mixture had an office with L.
L. Swan and lost a few things.

OATS OVER HUNDRED
BUSHELS PER ACRE

Cottage Grove, Aug. 6.—Harvest-
ing has begun in this vicinity, and
notwithstanding the long and unusu-
ally dry weather, the farmers report
the yield very good. On the Stewart
& Porter Brothers' farm, located on
Row river, four miles east of here,
the oats will go over 80 bushels to
the acre, and at Dorena a field of oats
will go over 100 bushels to the acre,
many of the heads being from eight
to sixteen inches in length. The hay
crop is in excess of the farmers' ex-
pectations.

LANE-LINN COUNTY
SURVEY POSTPONED

Albany, Or., Aug. 6.—The crew to
survey the Lane-Linn county bound-
ary line did not leave for the scene
of operations today as was expected.
County Surveyor A. L. Biddle re-
ceived a message this morning from
County Surveyor C. M. Collier, of
Lane county, stating that he would
be unable to leave Eugene until next
Monday, so the Lane crew will re-
main here until that date.

WHAT WILL O.
MILLICAN'S LAND
BE ASSESSED AT

What will the price of thirteen
acres of Oscar Millican's place be,
when the jury decides on the mooted
point after the trial next Monday?
Attorney John M. Pipes stated this
morning that the lawyers for the
city would call about a dozen wit-
nesses, and he expects that the
counsel for Millican will call even
more to aid the jury in reaching a
valuation.

Oscar Millican wants \$31,600 for
the thirteen acres of land, and the
city offers but \$15,000. Millican
alleges that the power canal will
run his whole hundred acres farm
by overflowing, and will render it
of no worth to him.

On the other hand the city main-
tains that the canal will be an ac-
tual benefit to the land, for what
water will escape from the ditch will
sub-irrigate the land, the most val-
uable form of watering. To prove
this point several foremost irriga-
tion experts will be called to the
stand.

The case has already inconven-
ienced the city in its work on the
power site, for the city has not yet
been able to cut its way through the
farm. The case was set at a very
late date to permit Millican to re-
cover from an unusual severe case
of what is supposed to be German
measles, a kind that rarely lasts
longer than thirty-six hours.

The counsel for the city are L.
Blyen and John M. Pipes; for Mil-
lican, A. C. Hardy, H. W. Thompson,
E. O. Potter and A. C. Woodcock.

COTTAGE GROVE WANTS
MOUNTAIN WATER

Cottage Grove, Or., Aug. 6.—A
mass meeting was held at the city
hall tonight to discuss the propo-
sition of pumping water from Lang
creek, a mountain stream to this city,
a distance of 18 miles, having a fall
of 1000 feet. Ex-Senator R. M.
Veatch presided, with H. O. Thomp-
son as secretary. Mayor B. R. Job
opened the meeting. Speeches by
different citizens were made.
The city council was instructed to
employ an expert engineer at once to
make an estimate of the cost. Lang
creek will furnish an adequate sup-
ply of pure water for the city.

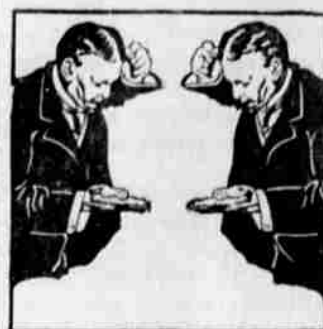
