HERE IT IS—THE DEER LAW

What You Can't Do to the Deer—
And What You May

The deer season opened August 1 and will continue open until November 1.

Buck deer only can be killed. Female deer are protected at all times. It is unlawful to hunt between one hour after sunset and one-half hour before sunrise.

It is unlawful to sell, offer for sale, barter or exchange any deer or the meat of any deer. Fine \$50 to \$250, or imprisonment for 60 to 90 days, or both fine and imprisonment.

It is unlawful to hunt or pursue deer with dogs, or to watch or lie in wait near runways, wet or dry stands, trails, creeks or rivers that deer are accustomed to use either when pursued by dog or dogs, or when changing their feeding grounds, or when going or coming to water, with intent to take, kill or injure any deer.

Unlawful to mutilate the carcass to disguise the sex.

Limit of kill, five buck deer in any open season.

A hunter can procure for a justice of the peace a tag for each of his five deer killed by himself, making an affidavit before the justice or the county clerk that he killed the deer, and by attaching this numbered tag to the deer hide he can ship or sell the skin.

Unlawful to kill or have in possession any spotted fawn or deer of the first year.

It shall be unlawful for any person at any time to enter any standing grain or upon any inclosed premises

not the property of the person entering into or upon the same, with intent to watch, secure, take or kill any bird, wild fowl or wild animal protected by the law, or to permit any dog or dogs with which such persons may be hunting to do so for such purposes without permission of the owner or person in charge of such premises. Fine, \$50 to \$150, or imprisonment 6 to 90 days, or both fine and imprisonment.

HARRIMAN ENJOINED FROM INTERFERING

Oregon Trunk Gets Injunction
Against Its Rival in Deschutes Canyon

Portland, Aug. 10.—On application of the Oregon Trunk, United States Judge Wolverton yesterday issued a temporary restraining order enjoining the Harriman forces from further operations on the southerly 60 miles of railroad they are constructing up the Deschutes canyon into Central Oregon. Included in the 60 miles covered in the restraining order there are not more than 20 miles where the surveys of the rival roads conflict, but the effect of the court's injunction is to suspend operations by Harriman camps for the entire distance until the merits of the controversy can be determined legally. Judge Wolverton has fixed next Friday, August 13, as the time when the Harriman representatives must appear and show cause why the injunction should not be made perpetual.

The complaint sets forth that the necessity and convenience of the public require the construction and operation of a railroad along the line located by the Oregon Trunk. It is further alleged that ever since the complainant company began preparation for the construction of its road the Harriman forces have trespassed upon its right of way, removed and destroyed grade stakes, and by use of powder have blown up and destroyed a part of the constructed roadbed of the Oregon Trunk. It is also charged against the Harriman company that its employees have further obstructed the right of way of the Oregon Trunk by constructing and maintaining a substantial wire fence across the latter company's survey.

Assaults on Workmen Feared
By reason of these facts it is represented that the Oregon Trunk is being delayed and interfered with in the construction of its road. Unless the restraining order was granted, the complainant alleged that "defendant's workmen will assault the employees of the plaintiff, and there will be numerous arrests and prosecutions in the courts for violation of law and order and numerous actions at law will be necessary to protect the complainant's rights."

On these representations, Judge Wolverton signed the temporary restraining order, which will be enforced pending a hearing as to a continuance of the injunction, which will be argued by opposing counsel Friday.

It is the contention of the representatives of the Oregon Trunk that the Harriman forces are not only trespassers in the sense that they are alleged to be obstructing and destroying construction work of the former road, but for the further alleged reason that the Harriman people do not have any rights in the canyon, so far as the public land is concerned, any further south than the first 40 miles.

ONLY ONE WAY TO BUILD CITIES

According to the Marshfield Daily Times, a prominent citizen of that place reached the following conclusion, after an extended tour over the Northwest, as far east as Wyoming:

"The only reason on earth why the most prosperous cities are located where they are is the energies and efforts of the citizens—in other words, he decided that a number of men with some money and the proper energy can build a city almost anywhere. Many of the cities of the interior of what is known as the Pacific Northwest have no particular natural resources behind them."

This is precisely the view The Guard has always taken. Cities do not grow up but instead are built up by the enterprise and energy of their people.

Eugene has doubled in size in three years simply because the people were awakened to their opportunities. It will continue to grow even more rapidly in the future if the same spirit of enterprise is manifested.

The building of the railroad to Klamath Falls presents wonderful opportunities for this city in the way of business expansion, but we must be alert to take advantage of it if we would reap the full benefits that should accrue from it.

The movement to build a railroad down the Siuslaw and to Coos Bay, if carried out, would alone double our population and volume of business in three years. It will cost some money to get the road started, but it will bring back to the community ten times the amount expended in only a short while. The main point, which should not be lost sight of, is that since we have started out to build a city here there is no good stopping place. We must work more energetically than ever along all lines of endeavor, assured, by the results achieved during the past three years, that success will crown our efforts.

THE THAW INSANITY CASE

To the lay mind the testimony of Dr. Baker, of the New York state hospital for the insane at Matteawan, is conclusive that the time for Harry Thaw's release is not yet ripe, if indeed it ever will be, says the Pocatello Tribune. Mr. Baker, in whose care and custody the man has been for seven months, is not satisfied that Thaw is sane. The time when insanity of any sort is really and permanently cured is a matter exceedingly difficult to determine. It often happens that at the urgent solicitation of the relatives and friends of a patient, one will be released before, in the judgment of the physicians, he is sufficiently restored to warrant granting him freedom. But it is a fact which the insanity experts agree upon, when conferring with one another, that the one form of insanity for which they have never found any remedy and for which they can never give any guarantee of recovery is paranoia.

"Circular insanity" it is sometimes called, indicating that the malady is recurrent, and that the violent phases recur as though the disease moved in circles or orbits, reaching its perihelion at certain intervals, though in paranoia there is no known method such as astronomers have of calculating the orbit and the period. The safest place for the paranoiac is in a good tight asylum. In cases that have occurred in every state of the Union the release of the "cured" patient has been followed within a short time by the commission of some homicide, the victims not infrequently being the very ones of whom the patient might have been supposed to be the most fond.
