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HOW TO SAVE CRIMINALS IS THE QUESTION

Bothers Clergymen, Physicians
and Students, as Well
as the Police

Seattle, Aug. 14.—Educators, jurists, clergymen, physicians, penitentiary wardens and prominent men from all other walks of life from every section of the United States and Canada will deliver addresses and read papers before the convention of the American Prison Association, which opened today in Seattle. The character and manifestation of crime in its varied aspects; the character of the criminal; his detection, arrest, trial and conviction, his reformatory or penitentiary treatment, and the steps taken to reform him and restate him in society are the vital topics which will be discussed by the delegates.

Los Angeles Anniversary
Los Angeles, Aug. 14.—Los Angeles will celebrate tomorrow the 128th anniversary of the founding of the city by the Spanish padres. There will be a special religious service and a revival of the old Spanish rites, customs and games.

On Sunday, August 15, 1771, Felipe de Neve, governor of Alta California, came from the San Gabriel mission to the Indian village of Yang-na, and gave to the settlement the name of El Pueblo de Nuestra Señora, la Reina de los Angeles—the Town of Our Lady, the Queen of the Angels. As is fitting, the commemoration of the event falls to the Spanish, who gave the town its beginning and controlled its destinies for nearly a century. It accords well with the spirit of things, too, that the Church of Our Lady of the Angels (Plaza church) will be the scene of the festival, which is to be called the festival of Portuncula, the latter name being one that was applied to the Los Angeles river in the days when it probably was more mighty than it is now.

Germans Celebrate
St. Louis, Aug. 14.—Congressman Richard Bartholdt, the friend of peace and arbitration, will be the principal speaker at the celebration here tomorrow of the 190th anniversary of a great battle. The event commemorated is the famous battle of Teutoburger forest, which was fought in the year A. D. 9, when Arminius broke the iron wall of Roman aggression and provoked the Emperor Augustus to cry out to his defeated general, "Varus! Varus, give me back my legions." A great gathering of Germans will do honor to the great event in German history.

Memorial to Irish
Atlantic City, Aug. 14.—An island in the St. Lawrence river will be the scene tomorrow of the unveiling of a statue to commemorate the thousands of Irish who, fleeing from the famine of 1847, died and were buried there after their arrival in America. The island in the St. Lawrence was the final resting place. Arrangements for the ceremony were made by the executive council of the Ancient Order of Hibernians at a session here.

Fat Men Meet
Portland, Me., Aug. 14.—Several tons of adipose humanity assembled in Portland today at the annual meeting of the New England Fat Men's Club. A clambake is the feature of the entertainment program, arranged for the hefty ones. "We are fat and are glad of it" is the slogan of the club. A movement is on foot to elect President Taft to honorary membership.

Perth Amboy, Aug. 14.—Delegates representing lodges of the Danish Brotherhood in New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Connecticut and Massachusetts are arriving here today to take part in tomorrow's meet-

ing of the eastern section of the order.

Orlando, Fla., Aug. 14.—A general convention of the Christian Endeavor Leagues of the African Methodist church was opened here today.

Gibbons at Salt Lake
Salt Lake City, Aug. 14.—Cardinal Gibbons and other distinguished prelates will take part tomorrow in the dedication of the new Catholic cathedral in the Mormon city. The new structure is one of the finest in the country.

Grant, third, of the corps of engineers, United States army.

The assignment is one of the sinecures for an army officer at the capital. It will enable Young Grant to spend the winter in Washington, where his wife can be with her parents, Senator and Mrs. Elihu Root.

EXTENSION OF RAILROAD MAY MEAN SMELTER

Another Mining District May
Exist Up the Middle
Fork

The Natron extension up the Willamette may open another mining district equal to Blue River or Be-hemia, and with development of all three a smelter is a very plausible possibility. That there is good gold bearing ore up the Middle Fork is evinced by the reports from Dr. Christie and his associates. Other Middle and North Forkers are confident that more strikes will be made.

Lane county mines have long needed a smelter, as freight shipments with the best reduction plants have proven expensive, especially as railroad connections have been either lacking entirely or wholly inadequate. An electric line up the McKenzie would help the Blue River properties; extension of the "Show and Easy" out of Cottage Grove, would benefit Be-hemia, and a main line through to California up the Willamette would make a big centre for a smelter near Eugene.

**IS THE STABLE
DOOMED AS WELL
AS THE HORSE?**

That the horse is a thing of the past, or soon will be, has long been the opinion of many Eugene people, but that in the ordinary city there will not be a livery stable in twenty years, is something that has not been considered. Yet it was only yesterday that such a possibility was discussed in the lobby of a Eugene hotel by several good thinkers in the community.

A livery stable now is a necessity, but if the horse is doomed, so must it be. That the riddance of the livery stable will also rid the community in part of that great horde of flies that swoop down each summer is equally true, to judge from the printed statements of boards of health from Los Angeles to Portland, Me. Flies, a single one of which may kill more people, though indirectly, than a rattlesnake, are usually bred in horse manure, and do not breed prolifically any place else. Hence the modern towns will conquer the flies by destroying the birth spots—such as barns and stables.
