A HIGH CALLING

Year by year the influence of the press has been extended until at this time it is far and away the most potent factor in modern life. Not only does modern journalism influence politics, but it is coming more and more to affect the moral life of the people.

"Is the newspaper press to be the great custodian of morals? Shall the church resign its de facto leadership?" says the Editor and Publisher.

"Religion and morality have come out of the steeped edifices into the streets, the theatres, the secular public halls, to be a subject of discussion, side by side with the subjects of politics and economics. It is the newspapers that have brought them out of the sacred doors.

"Would not ministers of religion more effectively promote their cause by going hand in hand with the press?

"And what of the press and its future as a moral force?

"We went along the street in a certain city. We talked with a stationer, a jeweler, a dry goods merchant, a blacksmith and a lawyer. We asked about a certain successful paper, and this is what they said:

"It is a good paper, one of the best in the state. We read it at home. It is good because the man who owns and runs it is good. His character is reflected through the paper."

"Shall the newspaper finally assume formal leadership in morality?

"Consider the responsibility. It is greatest upon the publisher. It is full upon every editor, every reporter, every member of the business staff. It rests upon every man and woman who loyally helps to make the newspaper.

"Shall it undertake it?

"It is a grand work."

A short time ago a man named Pointer committed suicide in New York. The next morning the newspapers of that city made only a brief mention of the tragedy, for the man was poor and friendless. All kinds of deaths are chronicled every day by the press. Occasionally a sensation is sprung, and for weeks thereafter the name of the dead person is printed several times a day, remarks an exchange. After the Pointer case had been investigated in accordance with city ordinance and state law, it developed that the man had once been a staff officer with Joe Wheeler. He was brevetted for gallantry. After the war he engaged in various enterprises, mostly unfortunate, but all honorable. In the end he found himself still a soldier with a proud spirit, but penniless. In the pockets of the dead man were found a number of pawn tickets. The one bearing the most recent date was connected with a confederate medal of honor. Everything else had gone before it. There are Colonel Pointers in every county and state, old and young, who have had their days of fortune and misfortune, all worthy sufferers, too proud to beg, too honest to steal, all succumbing slowly to the inevitable. Unfortunately they do not seek the relief that would be given them. There are philanthropists and churches and the Salvation Army always in search of isolated and uncomplaining misery. The penniless, friendless man with the proud spirit is the unhappiest man of all.

The first thing the newcomer asks of any town is, "What keeps it up?" "What makes it?" "What industries and resources are behind this place?" You hear these questions on the streets, on the trains, in the hotel lobbies, everywhere. It is the duty of every Eugene citizen, in spite of all the advertising Eugene has had, all the favorable mentions, and the reputation that she has acquired, to speak of the wonderful resources of Lane county upon which Eugene's prosperity rests, of the boundless forests, of the wonderful fruit, and of the cattle and grain crops. Pick out the things that the newcomer is interested in, the things he knows about, and show where they exist.

Eugene will have a wonderful productive agency in the city power plant up the McKenzie. Ashland has a power plant, too, but her's will be but 600 horsepower, while Eugene's will be over 2000.

ATTORNEYS FOR MILLICAN ASK FOR NEW TRIAL

Motion Filed Today Based on Various Alleged Errors of Court

The attorneys for Oscar Millican in the suit of the City of Eugene against him for condemnation of right-of-way for the city's power canal, this morning filed a motion to set aside the verdict of the jury and for a new trial, and the motion was argued this afternoon. The motion is based on the following grounds:

Error of the court in refusing to grant the motion for non-suit filed by the defendant.

Error of the court in refusing the motion of defendant to take the case from the jury and direct a verdict for the defendant.

Error of the court in instructing the jury.

Error of the court in submitting to the jury in the instructions of the court the matter of special benefits to the defendant.

That the evidence was insufficient to justify the verdict and that the verdict of the jury returned is against the law.

Error of the court in submitting to the jury the question of the necessity of condemnation.

Error of the court in submitting to the jury the necessity of the land described in the complaint.

Error of the court in submitting to the jury the question of how much of the lands described in the complaint should be appropriated by the plaintiff.

Error of the court in recalling the jury and instructing the jury on the matter of special benefits to the defendant and submitting the question of special benefits to the jury.

WISCONSIN MAN THINKS PROHIBITION STRONG POINT

Says Dry Territory Will Attract Hundreds of Best Kind of Newcomers

Soil and Climate More Favorable Than Low Valley Land

Fruit growers south of Eugene in the Spencer creek hills are of the opinion that their district will become famous, if not over the world, over Lane county, for the fine fruit that can be grown among the valleys and on the side hills. The orchards that were planted eight or nine years ago have now come to their prime, and no better are to be seen in the vicinity of Eugene.

Not only is the soil different from the valley, but so are the climatic elements. Some of the little dales are much warmer than the surrounding country, and the hill sides are often more favorable than the flatter lower land. For these reasons the owners of land in the region expect their property to advance in reputation and worth.

Most of the orchards are in apples, pears and peaches. There are also prunes.
